



Florida Arbovirus Surveillance

Week 29: July 17-23, 2016

Arbovirus surveillance in Florida includes endemic mosquito-borne viruses such as West Nile virus (WNV), Eastern equine encephalitis virus (EEEV), and St. Louis encephalitis virus (SLEV), as well as exotic viruses such as dengue virus (DENV), chikungunya virus (CHIKV) and California encephalitis group viruses (CEV). Malaria, a parasitic mosquito-borne disease is also included. During the period of July 17-23, 2016 the following arboviral activity was recorded in Florida.

WNV activity: No human cases of WNV infection were reported this week. No horses with WNV infection were reported this week. One sentinel chicken tested positive for antibodies to WNV this week in Orange County. In 2016, positive samples from 51 sentinel chickens, one horse, and two mosquito pools have been received from ten counties.

SLEV activity: No human cases of SLEV infection were reported this week. One sentinel chicken tested positive for antibodies to SLEV this week in Lee County. In 2016, one positive sample from sentinel chickens has been received from one county.

EEEV activity: No human cases of EEEV infection were reported this week. One horse with EEEV infection was reported this week in Washington County. One sentinel chicken tested positive for antibodies to EEEV this week in Leon County. In 2016, positive samples from 51 sentinel chickens and 13 horses have been received from 16 counties.

International Travel-Associated Dengue Fever Cases: No cases of dengue fever were reported this week in persons that had international travel. In 2016, 31 travel-associated cases have been reported.

Dengue Fever Cases Acquired in Florida: No cases of locally acquired dengue fever were reported this week. In 2016, one case of locally acquired dengue fever has been reported.

International Travel-Associated Chikungunya Fever Cases: No cases of chikungunya fever were reported this week in persons that had international travel. In 2016, five travel-associated cases have been reported.

Chikungunya Fever Cases Acquired in Florida: No cases of locally acquired chikungunya fever were reported this week. In 2016, no cases of locally acquired chikungunya fever have been reported.

International Travel-Associated Zika Fever Cases: Thirty-nine cases of Zika fever were reported this week in persons that had international travel. In 2016, 327 travel-associated cases have been reported. No cases of locally acquired Zika fever have been reported.

Advisories/Alerts: Bay, Jefferson, Monroe, Polk, and St. Johns Counties are currently under mosquito-borne illness advisory. Twenty-eight counties are currently under a declared public health emergency due to the identification of travel-associated Zika infections: Alachua, Brevard, Broward, Charlotte, Citrus, Clay, Collier, Duval, Escambia, Highlands, Hillsborough, Lake, Lee, Manatee, Martin, Miami-Dade, Okaloosa, Okeechobee, Orange, Osceola, Palm Beach, Pasco, Pinellas, Polk, St. Johns, St. Lucie, Santa Rosa, Seminole, and Volusia Counties. There is a Level 2 (Alert) Travel Health Notice from the CDC for multiple countries in the Caribbean, Central and South America, Mexico, Cape Verde, and Pacific Islands related to Zika virus transmission and an association with poor pregnancy outcomes. Pregnant women should consider postponing travel to these areas. There is a Level 1 (Watch) Travel Health Notice from the CDC for multiple countries in the Caribbean, Central and South America, and Mexico, related to the transmission of chikungunya virus. 2016 Human Case Summary*

International Travel-Associated Chikungunya Fever Cases: Five cases of chikungunya with onset in 2016 have been reported in individuals with travel history to a chikungunya endemic country in the two weeks prior to onset. Countries of origin were Bahamas/Mexico, Bolivia (2), and Brazil (2). Counties reporting cases were Broward, Duval, Hillsborough, Palm Beach, and Pinellas.

International Travel-Associated Dengue Fever Cases: Thirty-one cases of dengue with onset in 2016 have been reported in individuals with travel history to a dengue endemic country in the two weeks prior to onset. Countries of origin were: Brazil (3), Colombia, Costa Rica (3), Cuba (7), Dominican Republic (2), El Salvador, Ghana, Jamaica (2), St. Barthelemy, Singapore, Haiti (3), Indonesia, Jamaica, Mexico, and Venezuela (3). Counties reporting cases were: Alachua (2), Brevard, Broward (7), Clay, Columbia, Hillsborough (2), Miami-Dade (8), Monroe, Orange (3), Pinellas, Palm Beach, Sarasota, and Seminole (2). Two cases were reported in non-Florida residents. In 2016, 22 of the 31 cases of dengue reported in Florida have been serotyped by PCR. Additional serotyping and strain typing are being conducted.

Dengue Fever Cases Acquired in Florida: In 2016, one case of locally acquired dengue fever has been reported in Monroe County, with onset in May. This case was reported in a non-Florida resident.

International Travel-Associated Zika Fever Cases: Three hundred twenty-seven cases of Zika fever have been reported in individuals with travel history to a country or area experiencing Zika virus activity. Countries of origin were: Anguilla, Barbados/Dominica, Belize (2), Bolivia (3), Brazil (5), Brazil/Bolivia/Peru, Caribbean, Colombia (29), Costa Rica, Cuba (2), Curacao/Guyana, Dominican Republic (74), Ecuador, El Salvador (4), Guadeloupe, Guatemala (3), Guyana (5), Haiti (20), Honduras (13), Honduras/Guatemala, Jamaica (38), Jamaica/Panama, Martinique (3), Nicaragua (23), Puerto Rico (66), St. Lucia, Suriname, Trinidad and Tobago (4), and Venezuela (20). Counties reporting cases were: Alachua (5), Brevard (6), Broward (51), Charlotte, Citrus (2), Clay (3), Collier (4), Duval (6), Escambia, Highlands, Hillsborough (9), Lake, Lee (6), Manatee, Martin, Miami-Dade (95), Okaloosa (2), Okeechobee, Orange (37), Osceola (17), Palm Beach (15), Pasco (6), Pinellas (7), Polk (11), St. Johns (3), St. Lucie, Santa Rosa, Seminole (11), and Volusia (5). Nineteen cases were reported in non-Florida residents. One Polk County case was acquired through sexual transmission. Seventeen of the 327 cases involve pregnant women whose counties of residence are not included in the individual county totals to protect privacy. Florida has been monitoring pregnant women with evidence of Zika virus infection regardless of symptoms since January. Including the seventeen pregnant cases mentioned, Florida is monitoring a total of 48 pregnant women.

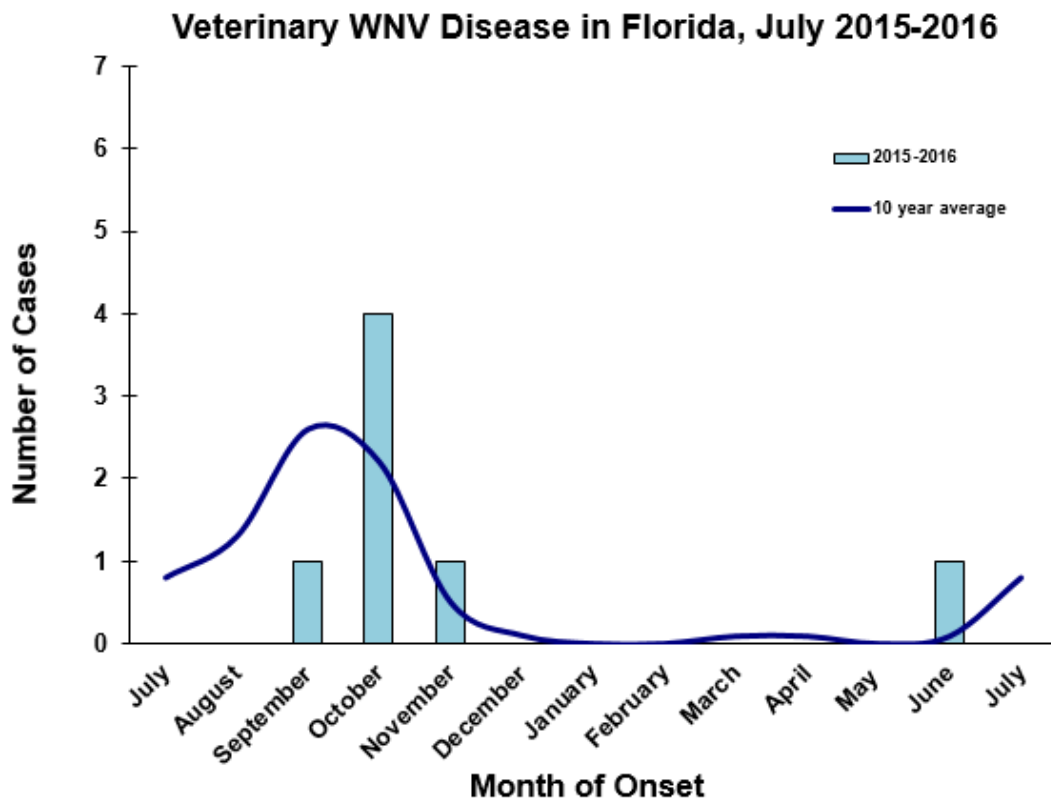
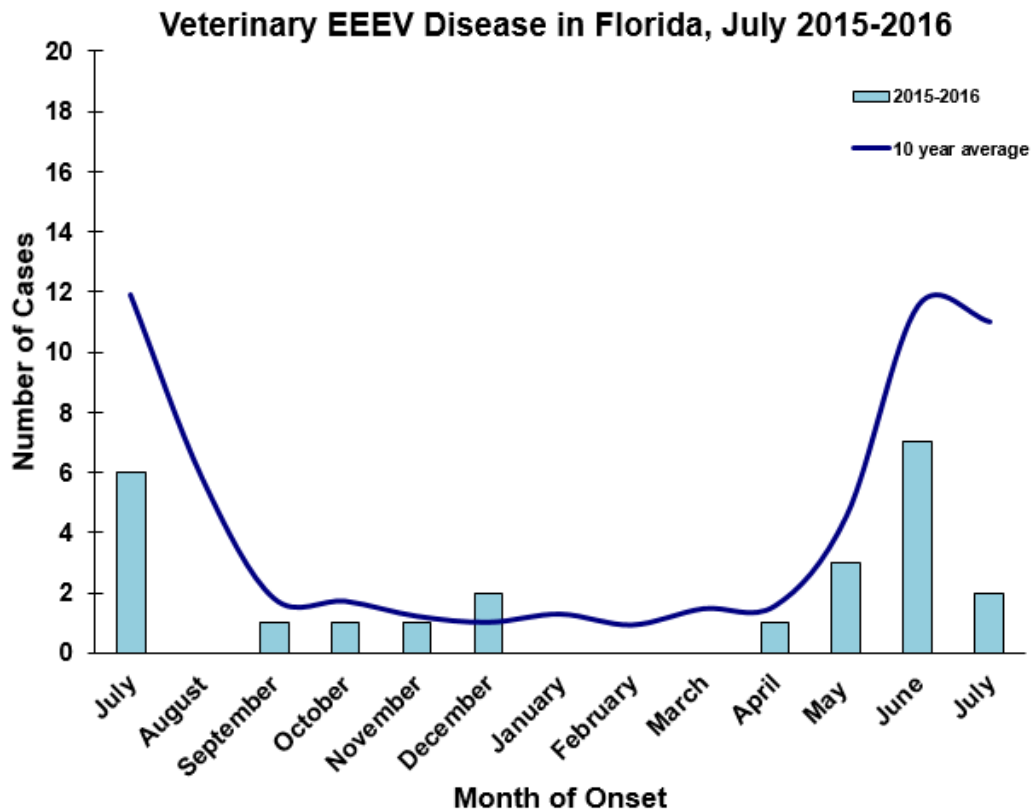
International Travel-Associated Malaria Cases: Twenty-six cases of malaria with onset in 2016 have been reported. Countries of origin were: Africa, Angola, Cameroon (2), Colombia, Democratic Republic of the Congo (2), Dominican Republic, Haiti (3), Honduras, India, Kenya, Nigeria (6), Sierra Leone (2), Sudan, Uganda, and Venezuela (2). Counties reporting cases were: Alachua, Broward (5), Duval, Flagler, Hernando, Hillsborough (2), Leon, Miami-Dade (6), Orange (4), Palm Beach, St. Lucie (2), and Sarasota Counties. Three cases were reported in non-Florida residents.

Twenty cases (77%) were diagnosed with *Plasmodium falciparum*. Five cases (19%) were diagnosed with *Plasmodium vivax*. One case (4%) was diagnosed with *Plasmodium malariae*.

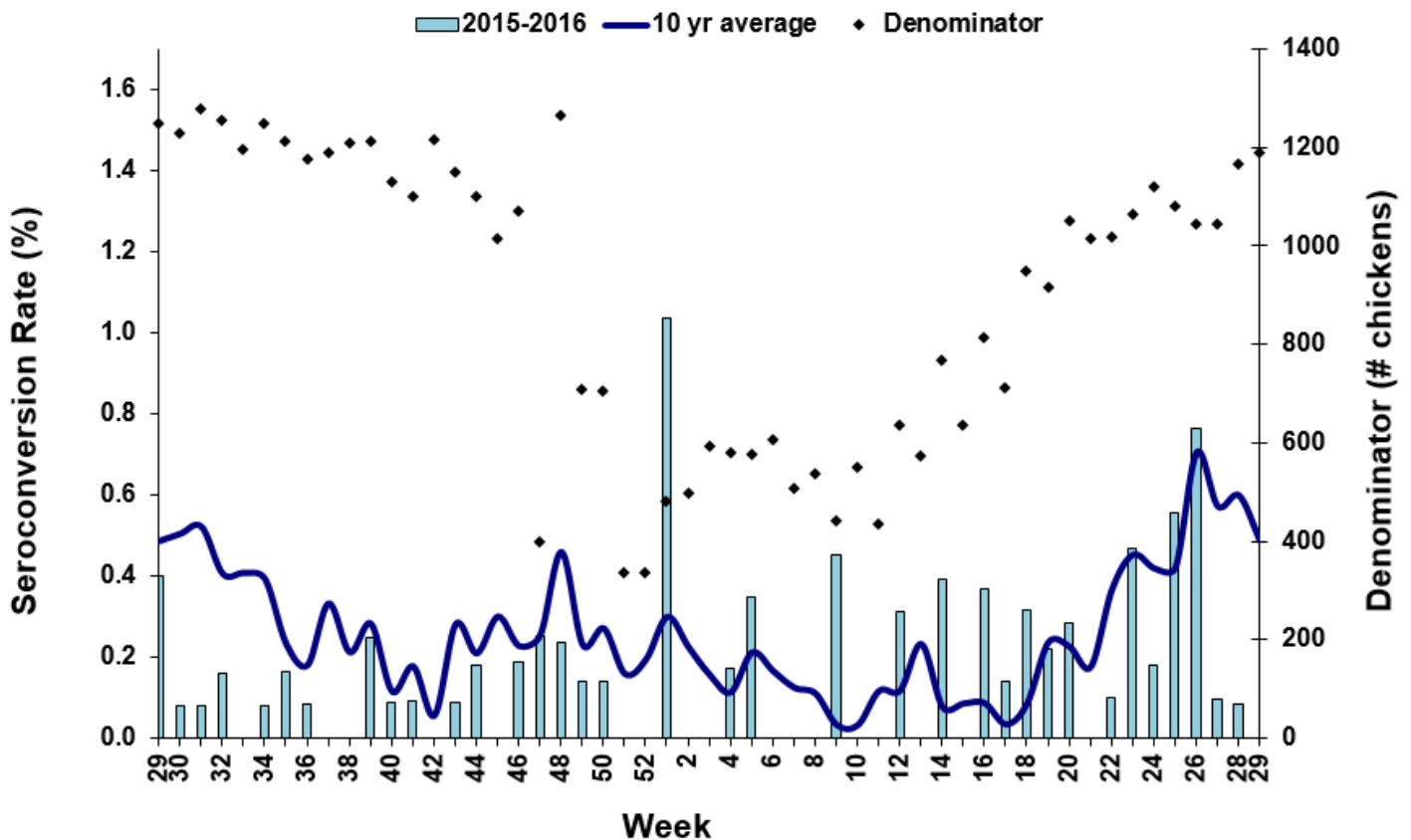
Sentinel Chickens*

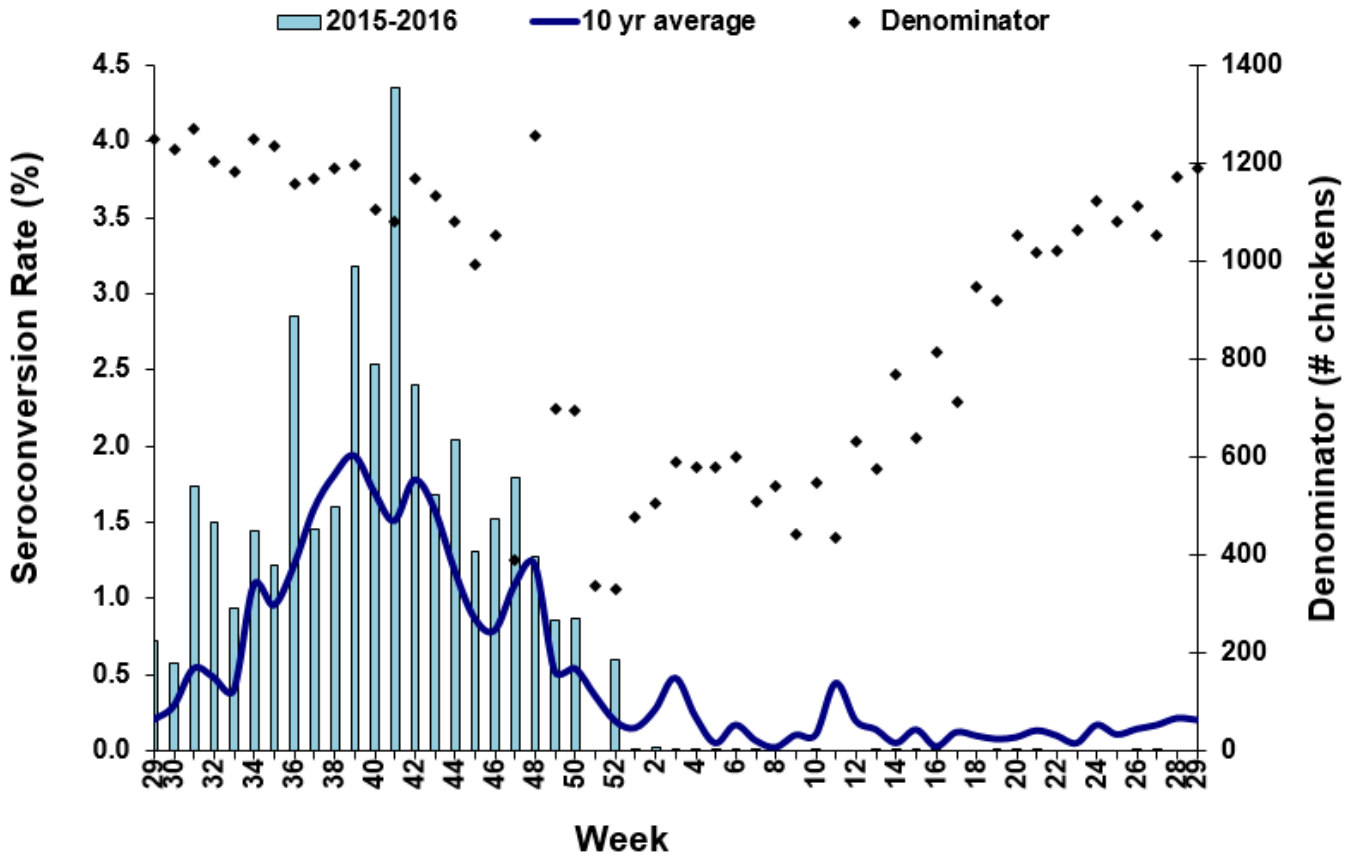

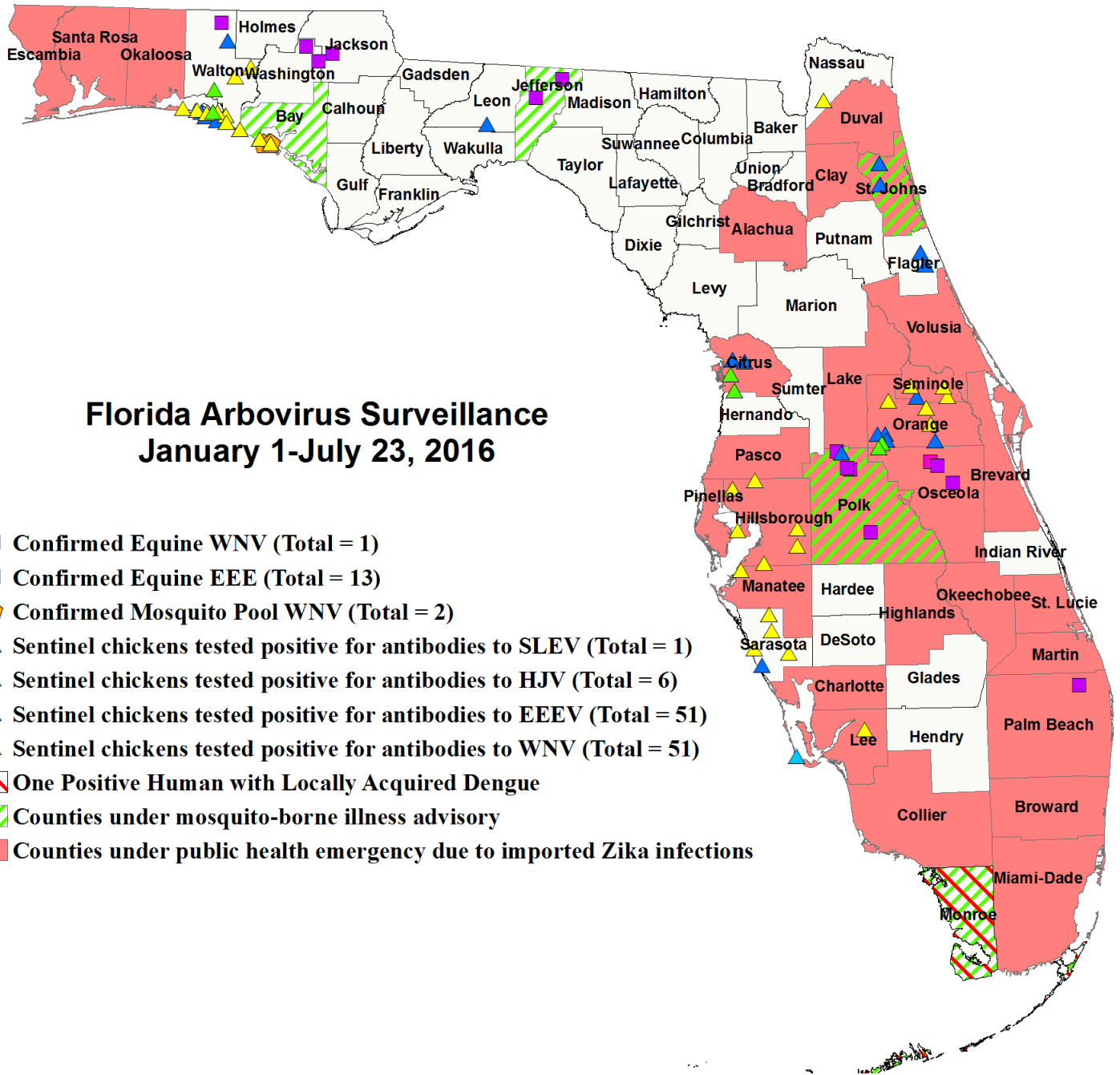

Dead Birds

The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) collects reports of dead birds, which can be an indication of arbovirus circulation in an area. This week, 8 reports representing a total of 32 dead birds, including 2 raptors, and 3 doves were received from 6 counties.

In 2016, 302 reports representing a total of 945 dead birds (57 crows, 3 jays, 60 raptors, and 10 doves) were received from 47 of Florida's 67 counties. Please note that FWC collects reports of birds that have died from a variety of causes, not only arboviruses. Dead birds should be reported to www.myfwc.com/bird/.

**Case tallies included in the weekly Florida arbovirus surveillance report include confirmed and probable cases for EEE, WNV infection, SLE, dengue, chikungunya, and malaria by date of onset. Suspect cases are not included. Activity is mapped by county of exposure rather than county of residence. Case definitions being used in Florida are consistent with national criteria provided by the Council of State and Territorial Epidemiologists (CSTE) and may be viewed at: <http://www.floridahealth.gov/diseases-and-conditions/disease-reporting-and-management/disease-reporting-and-surveillance/index.html>. Case tallies reported by CDC do not include suspect cases and cases are reported by patient state of residence rather than where the exposure occurred. Data is provided by county health departments, Department of Health Bureau of Public Health Laboratories, Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, mosquito control agencies, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, medical providers and veterinarians. Equine cases are provided by the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.
