Child Care and Head Start Facilities Immunization Assessment 2014–2015

INFORMATION ONLY

In March 2015, the Immunization Section completed the annual *Child Care and Head Start Facilities Immunization Assessment 2014–2015*, in collaboration with the Department of Children and Families (DCF). This assessment assists the Department of Health in evaluating the immunization status of children from birth to age 49 months, in child care facilities, in accordance with the schedule recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices.

Purpose:

- To obtain a statewide representation of immunization levels in child care populations in relation to the State and national goal of 90 percent coverage
- To determine the percentage of children attending these facilities who are up-to-date on their immunizations
- To determine the level of compliance with immunization regulations at child care and Head Start facilities
- To identify children with adequate immunization levels who have expired exemptions or lack proper documentation of immunizations

Method:

The ratio of Florida facilities fitting sample selection criteria was 93 percent child care and seven percent Head Start. Based on the ratio, of the 240 facilities randomly selected as the statewide sample, 223 were child care and 17 were Head Start. The child care population was obtained from DCF's *Master List of Child Care Providers*, Statewide. The Head Start population was obtained from the Head Start Early Childhood Learning & Knowledge Center's Head Start Locator list.

At each facility, field staff audited ten randomly selected immunization records of children 19 months of age and older (19–59 months of age), totaling 2,400 records. Field staff also audited up to ten records of children under 19 months of age, per facility if applicable, totaling 887 records. The results of this assessment reflect those 3,287 randomly selected records.

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Child Care Specific Results:

Of the 2,230 children 19 months of age and older, 94.9 percent were fully immunized with 4 DTaP, 3 polio, 1 MMR, 1 varicella, and up-to-date for Hib and PCV. Of the remaining children in this age group, 3.2 percent had a valid exemption from immunization, 0.3 percent had no immunization record on file, and 1.6 should have been issued a Temporary Medical Exemption (TME) but were not. Children who had properly documented immunization records totaled 93.1 percent.

Of the 852 children under 19 months of age, 92.0 percent were not due immunization at the time of the assessment. Children with valid exemptions accounted for 2.3 percent of the total; and 5.6 percent were overdue for immunization.

Head Start Specific Results:

Of the 170 children 19 months of age and older, 97.1 percent were fully immunized with the above listed vaccines. Of the remaining children in this age group, 3.0 percent had a valid exemption from immunization. All children had immunization records on file, 96.5 percent of which were properly documented.

Of the 35 children under 19 months of age, 97.1 percent were not due immunization at the time of the assessment, and 2.9 percent were overdue for immunization.

Opportunities for Improvement:

- As county health departments (CHDs) become aware, contact those medical providers who
 incorrectly certify immunization records. These could be records CHD clinic staff have viewed while
 providing immunization services, or from local child care centers the CHD contacts on a routine or
 random basis. Offer the medical provider the Creating Forms in Florida SHOTS link regarding
 electronic immunization record certification. Provide a physical and/or electronic copy of the current
 Immunization Guidelines for Florida Schools, Childcare Facilities and Family Daycare Homes.
- Contact local child care centers and request to speak with the person(s) responsible for verifying immunization records. Ask to review student immunization records together to provide guidance related to child care immunization requirements. Provide a copy of the current *Immunization Guidelines for Florida Schools, Childcare Facilities and Family Daycare Homes*. Explain the proper use of the 30-day grace period facilities may grant transfer students, as well as the benefits of having a reliable tracking system by immunization record expiration date.
- The CHDs and the DCF District Child Care Licensing Specialists should work closely with childcare
 facilities to ensure these facilities maintain an adequate tracking and follow-up method for children
 who have incomplete immunizations. Children must be age-appropriately immunized, with proper
 documentation supporting the child's current immunization status.

The Immunization Section thanks licensing specialists, Head Start officials, participating child care and CHD staff for their assistance with this assessment. Each of us plays an integral role in the continuing mission to protect all people in Florida from vaccine-preventable diseases.
