

Florida Arbovirus Surveillance Week 42: October 16-22, 2022

Arbovirus surveillance in Florida includes endemic mosquito-borne viruses such as West Nile virus (WNV), Eastern equine encephalitis virus (EEEV), and St. Louis encephalitis virus (SLEV), as well as exotic viruses such as dengue virus (DENV), chikungunya virus (CHIKV), Zika virus (ZIKV) and California encephalitis group viruses (CEV). Malaria, a parasitic mosquito-borne disease is also included. During the period of October 16-22, 2022, the following arboviral activity was recorded in Florida.

WNV activity: No human cases of WNV infection were reported this week. No horses with WNV infection were reported this week. Nine sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to WNV this week in Lee, Martin, St. Lucie, Volusia, and Walton counties. Four mosquito pools tested positive for WNV this week in Lee and Sarasota counties. In 2022, positive samples from two humans, three horses, 309 sentinel chickens, and eight mosquito pools have been reported from 26 counties.

SLEV activity: No human cases of SLEV infection were reported this week. No sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to SLEV this week. In 2022, eight positive samples have been reported from seven counties.

Flavivirus (WNV or SLEV)* activity: Two sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to a flavivirus this week in Nassau and St. Lucie counties. In 2022, positive samples from 17 sentinel chickens have been reported from 11 counties.

EEEV activity: No human cases of EEEV infection were reported this week. No horses with EEEV infection were reported this week. Two sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to EEEV this week in Alachua and Walton counties. In 2022, positive samples from 60 sentinel chickens and 11 horses have been reported from 22 counties.

International Travel-Associated Dengue: Seventeen cases of dengue were reported this week in persons that had international travel. In 2022, 589 travel-associated dengue cases have been reported.

Dengue Cases Acquired in Florida: Five cases of locally acquired dengue were reported this week in Broward, Miami-Dade, and Volusia counties. In 2022, 35 cases of locally acquired dengue have been reported.

International Travel-Associated Chikungunya Fever Cases: No cases of chikungunya fever were reported this week in persons that had international travel. In 2022, no travel-associated chikungunya fever cases have been reported.

Chikungunya Fever Cases Acquired in Florida: No cases of locally acquired chikungunya fever were reported this week. In 2022, no cases of locally acquired chikungunya fever have been reported.

International Travel-Associated Zika Fever Cases: No cases of Zika fever were reported this week in persons that had international travel. In 2022, no travel-associated Zika fever cases have been reported.

Zika Fever Cases Acquired in Florida: No cases of locally acquired Zika fever were reported this week. In 2022, no cases of locally acquired Zika fever have been reported.

Advisories/Alerts: Broward, Miami-Dade, and Volusia Counties are currently under a mosquito-borne illness alert. Bay, Charlotte, Collier, Hillsborough, Lee, Osceola, Palm Beach, Pinellas, Sarasota, and Walton counties

are currently under a mosquito-borne illness advisory. No other counties are currently under a mosquito-borne illness advisory or alert.

There are currently multiple travel health notices from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention related to mosquito-borne diseases.

2022 Human Case Summary

West Nile Virus Illnesses Acquired in Florida: Two human cases of WNV illness acquired in Florida have been reported in 2022 from Volusia County (July, August).

International Travel-Associated Dengue Cases: Five hundred and eighty-nine cases with onset in 2022 have been reported in individuals with travel history to a dengue endemic area in the two weeks prior to onset. Counties reporting cases were: Brevard (2), Broward (35), Collier (7), Duval (7), Escambia (2), Flagler, Hendry, Hernando (2), Hillsborough (55), Lee (22), Leon, Manatee (2), Martin (2), Miami-Dade (393), Monroe (3), Orange (6), Osceola, Palm Beach (19), Pasco, Pinellas (7), Polk (8), Sarasota (4), St. Johns, St. Lucie (5), and Volusia (2). Six cases were reported in non-Florida residents. Six cases met the criteria for severe dengue (dengue shock syndrome [DSS] or dengue hemorrhagic fever [DHF]). Those at greater risk for DSS and DHF include persons with previous dengue infection, pregnant women, infants, the elderly, and those with comorbidities. However, severe illness can also occur in those without any of these risk factors. In 2022, 501 cases of dengue reported in Florida have been serotyped by PCR. Please see the table below for a breakdown of case by country of origin and serotype.

Dengue Cases Acquired in Florida: In 2022, 35 cases of locally acquired dengue have been reported in Collier, Broward (2), Miami-Dade (31), and Volusia counties, with onsets in June, July (5), August (17), September (9), and October (3). One case was reported in a non-Florida resident. Thirty-one of the cases have been serotyped by PCR. Serotypes reported were DENV-3 (30) and DENV-2.

International Travel-Associated Malaria Cases: Forty-one cases of malaria with onset in 2022 have been reported. Countries of origin were: Brazil (3), Cameroon (3), Central African Republic, Côte D'Ivoire, Ethiopia (2), Equatorial Guinea, Ghana (3), Guinea (2), India, Kenya, multiple countries (2), Nicaragua (3), Nigeria (11), Sierra Leone (2), Sudan, Uganda (2), Venezuela, and Zambia. Counties reporting cases were: Brevard, Broward (7), Duval (5), Flagler, Hillsborough (4), Lee (4), Leon, Miami-Dade (4), Orange (5), Palm Beach (3), Pasco, Pinellas (2), Santa Rosa, and St. Johns (2). Five cases were reported in non-Florida residents.


Twenty-five cases (61%) were diagnosed with *Plasmodium falciparum*. Thirteen cases (32%) were diagnosed with *Plasmodium vivax*. Three cases (7%) were diagnosed with *Plasmodium malariae*.


**Veterinary cases are reported by date of onset. Only mammalian veterinary cases are included in the graphs.

Veterinary EEEV Disease in Florida, October 2021-2022




Sentinel Chickens


Nine sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to WNV this week in Lee, Martin, St. Lucie, Volusia, and Walton counties. Two sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to EEEV this week in Alachua and Walton counties. Two sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to a flavivirus this week in Nassau and St. Lucie counties.

Dead Birds


The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) collects reports of dead birds, which can be an indication of arbovirus circulation in an area. This week, 43 reports representing a total of 228 dead birds, including three raptors, were received from 19 counties.


In 2022, 1313 reports representing a total of 3775 dead birds (112 crows, 36 jays, 186 raptors, 155 doves) were received from 56 of Florida's 67 counties.

^{*}Seventeen chickens in 2022 have tested positive for flavivirus antibodies and require additional specialized testing to distinguish between WNV and SLEV antibodies. Testing is currently delayed due to supply chain issues. The final determination of these birds will be updated as more information becomes available. In Florida, both WNV and SLEV have similar disease vectors and epidemiology. Seroconversion rates for flavivirus are included in the table.

Case tallies included in the weekly Florida arbovirus surveillance report include confirmed and probable cases for EEE, WNV infection, SLE, dengue, chikungunya, and malaria by date of onset. Suspect cases are not included. Activity is mapped by county of exposure rather than county of residence. Case definitions being used in Florida are consistent with national criteria provided by the Council of State and Territorial Epidemiologists (CSTE) and may be viewed at: www.floridahealth.gov/diseases-and-conditions/disease-reporting-and-management/disease-reporting-and-surveillance/index.html. Case tallies reported by CDC do not include suspect cases and cases are reported by patient state of residence rather than where the exposure occurred. Data is provided by county health departments, Department of

Health Bureau of Public Health Laboratories, Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, mosquito control agencies, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, medical providers and veterinarians. Equine cases are provided by the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.
