## DOH-GULF ISSUES RABIES ALERT

## Contact:

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**Gulf County**, **Fla.**—The Florida Department of Health in Gulf County (DOH-Gulf) is monitoring rabies among wild animals in the area. This is in response to a confirmed case of rabies in a fox that was killed in Wewahitchka off Orchard Drive in Gulf County on March 27, 2024. Test results confirmed positive for rabies on March 29, 2024. All residents and visitors should be aware that rabies may be currently present in the wild animal population.

People and domestic animals should always avoid physical contact with wild animals (e.g., raccoons, bats, foxes, skunks, otters, bobcats, coyotes), which carry a higher risk of human exposure and a need for rabies post-exposure treatment. If you are exposed to rabies, receiving appropriate treatment after exposure will protect you from the risk of rabies.

This rabies alert is for 60 days and includes the following boundaries in Gulf County:

Northern boundary: Our Town Road

Eastern boundary: Dead Lakes

• Southern boundary: Linton Road

• Western boundary: Our Town Road

## Take the following precautions to prevent rabies exposure:

- Keep pets under direct supervision and on a leash, and keep livestock secured on your property. If an animal bites your pet or livestock, seek veterinary assistance for the animal immediately and contact Gulf County Animal Control at 850-227-1115.
- Avoid contact with wild or stray animals. Do not handle, feed, or unintentionally attract
  them with outdoor pet food, open garbage cans, or other sources of food. If you have
  been bitten or scratched by a wild or domestic animal, seek medical attention, and report
  the injury to DOH-Gulf by calling 850-227-1276.
- Never adopt wild animals or bring them into your home; instead contact a <u>licensed</u> <u>wildlife rehabilitator</u>.
- Call your local animal control agency to remove any stray animals from your neighborhood. Contact Gulf County Animal Control at 850-227-1115.
- Immunize your pets and livestock based on your veterinarian's recommended schedule.
- Prevent wildlife, including <u>bats</u>, from entering living quarters or occupied spaces in homes, schools, and other similar areas where they might come in contact with people and pets.
