Introduction

Thomas Troelstrup called the meeting to order and the group made brief introductions. He then provided an agenda for the meeting which included an advisory committee overview, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) updates, and program updates for the three programs funded through the Preventive Health and Health Services Block Grant (PHHSBG). The meeting's presenters included Sean Isaac from the Public Health Dental Program, Elvira Hanson from the Violence and Injury and Prevention Program (VIPPP), and Sadé Collins from the Bureau of Chronic Disease Prevention Supporting Healthy Communities Program.

Mr. Troelstrup gave a brief background description of the PHHSBG and reiterated the alignment to Healthy People 2020 objectives. He also shared that the public hearing provides the opportunity for public input regarding the direction, planning, program content and funding decisions made by the advisory committee prior to work plan submission. Mr. Troelstrup reminded the committee members of the importance of their roles and their input for the development and implementation of the work plan, or application.

Public Health Dental Program

Sean Isaac began with the background the Public Health Dental Program Water Fluoridation Project. He shared dental diseases are chronic, progressive bacterial infections that affect all ages, races and ethnicities. Mr. Isaac proposed the following objective updates:

- FY 2017-2018 Objective 1: Community Information: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the PHDP will provide technical assistance and funding to partners for the promotion of water fluoridation and oral health to 25 of the largest non-fluoridated community water systems in Florida.
- FY 2017-2018 Objective 2: Community Water System Management: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the PHDP will review 117 fluoridating community water systems in Florida for reporting compliance in accordance with Florida Administrative Code. The PHDP will also review a sample of the reports to validate the data.
- FY 2017-2018 Objective 3: Partnerships: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the PHDP will provide technical assistance, information or funding to 4 non-fluoridating communities that have expressed an interest in attaining water fluoridation.

No questions were posed. Advisory Committee member, Tami Miller, commented on the importance of the funding for the programs continued success.

Violence and Injury Prevention Program

Elvira Hanson provided an update of the Violence and Injury Prevention Program. Ms. Hanson shared that the program would like to increase the use of evidence based interventions. PHHSBG funds are allocated to support prevention using the Green Dot strategy. Ms. Hanson proposed the following updates to the programs objectives:

- FY 2017-2018 Objective 1: Green Dot Exposure: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the Violence Injury and Prevention Program will increase the number of people exposed to Green Dot focus groups, social marketing campaigns, overview speech, or bystander training from 3,000 to 4,000.
- FY 2017-2018 Objective 3: Green Dot Implementation Using Public Health Approach: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the Violence Injury and Prevention Program will evaluate 3 PHHSBG-funded sites implementing the Green Dot strategy for the following: comprehensive, varied teaching methods, sufficient dosage, theory driven, strong, stable and positive relationships, appropriate timing, socio-culturally relevant.
- FY 2017-2018 Objective 4: Sexual Violence and Data Registry (SVDR): Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, Violence Injury and Prevention Program contract managers will analyze 3 PHHSBG-funded sites' data entered into the Sexual Violence and Data Registry to ensure compliance with contract deliverables.

No questions from committee members nor the public were posed.

Supporting Healthy Communities

Sadé Collins then discussed the "Healthy Places" approach to target Florida's population across the lifespan. Ms. Collins shared the Supporting Healthy Communities Program builds on the evidence-based infrastructure established through other Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) funding streams while leaving flexibility for county health departments to develop and implement innovative strategies that meet the needs of their communities. Ten national health objectives have been identified as the focus of this program. Those objectives, outlined by CDCs Healthy People 2020 objectives fall under two strategies: state health office support to county health departments (CHD) and promotion of "Healthy Places". "Healthy Places" is carried out as part of the Department's flagship prevention initiative Healthiest Weight Florida. The six "Healthy Places" seeks to make the healthy choice the easy choice across the lifespan. These places are birthing facilities, early care & education centers, schools, communities, worksites and health care settings. Additionally, four new objectives that fall under 'Community' were proposed. The new objectives focus on Lupus, arthritis, Sickle-Cell Anemia, and Alzheimer's disease. Ms. Collins then presented the following objective updates:

Birthing Facilities

• FY 2017-2018 Objective 1: Baby-Friendly USA: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the Department will increase the number of Baby-Friendly Hospitals in Florida from 13 to 16.

Early Care and Education

• FY 2017-2018 Objective 1: Early Childhood Education Centers: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the Department will promote participation in the newly created Florida Early Care and Education Recognition for improving practices and policies related to physical activity and nutrition from 0 to 15.

Healthy Schools

- FY 2017-2018 Objective 1: Comprehensive School Physical Activity Program: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the Department will increase the number schools that established, implemented and/or evaluated a CSPAP from 14 to 15.
- FY 2017-2018 Objective 2: Outreach and Promotion: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the Department will increase the number of schools ever earning HUSSC recognition from 550 to 600.

Worksites

• FY 2017-2018 Objective 1: Worksite Wellness: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the Department will increase the number of worksites using the online CDC Worksite Health Scorecard from 106 to 115.

Community: Built Environment

• FY 2017-2018 Objective 1: Physical Activity/Walking: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the Department will increase the number of cities and counties with complete streets policies listed on the Smart Growth America Complete Streets Atlas from 72 to 75.

Community: Food Access

• FY 2017-2018 Objective 1: Food Access for the Underserved: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the Department will establish 5 projects to increase access to foods recommended by the Dietary Guidelines for America in at least 2 underserved communities.

Community: New Objectives

- FY 2017-2018 Objective 1: Lupus: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the Department will promote the awareness of Lupus by disseminating information to communities.
- FY 2017-2018 Objective 1: Arthritis: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the Department will promote the awareness of arthritis by disseminating information to communities.
- FY 2017-2018 Objective 1: Sickle-Cell Anemia: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the Department will promote the awareness of Sickle-Cell Anemia by disseminating information to communities.
- FY 2017-2018 Objective 1: Alzheimer's Disease: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the Department will promote the awareness of Alzheimer's Disease by disseminating information to communities.

Health Care Settings

• FY 2017-2018 Objective 2: Diabetes Self- Management Education: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the Department will increase the number of adults diagnosed with diabetes who have at least one encounter at an American Diabetes Association (ADA)-recognized or American Association of Diabetes Educators (AADE)-accredited DSME program from 39,697 to 41,112.

• FY 2017-2018 Objective 1: Diabetes Prevention Program: Between 10/2017 and 09/2018, the Department will increase the number of individuals/FDOH staff trained as lifestyle change coaches from 0 to 5.
