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Introduction

The Hendry County Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) Annual Report presents a summary of the progress made in 2019 toward the objectives in the 2017-2019 CHIP. The CHIP priorities and objectives are set collaboratively by the Florida Department of Health in Hendry County and numerous community organizations that work together to accomplish them. This report provides a listing and status of the goals and objectives that were implemented during 2019, and a summary of the final results from this three-year CHIP cycle. While the CHIP is a community-driven and collectively owned health improvement plan, the Florida Department of Health in Hendry & Glades Counties (DOH-Hendry/Glades) is charged with providing administrative support, tracking and collecting data, and reporting results to the community.

The community members of Hendry & Glades combined both counties into one Community Health Improvement Plan 2019-2023 because of the size of Glades County. Glades County makes up 0.1% of Florida's population.

Overview of CHIP and Annual Review Meeting

In January of 2019, the Department of Health in Hendry & Glades Counties convened the CHIP Planning Team. The Planning Team facilitated the CHIP process by using the National Association of City and County Health Officials' Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnership (MAPP) strategic planning model. Subject matter experts from a diverse group of partner organizations conducted the four assessments outlined in the MAPP process. Individually, the assessment yielded in-depth analyses of factors and forces that impact population health. Taken together, the assessment findings contribute to a comprehensive view of health and quality of life in Hendry & Glades Counties.

The Planning Team developed findings and presented these findings to the Healthier Hendry Glades Task Force. The Healthier Hendry Glades Task Force comprised a diverse leadership group representing 17 agencies and organizations in Hendry & Glades Counties. The Healthier Hendry Glades Task Force set priorities through a facilitated consensus process by looking for cross-cutting strategic issues that emerged from the four assessments. The Healthier Hendry Glades Task Force reached consensus on two strategic issue areas: Mental Health and Child Safety. Please refer to the table below for strategic issue areas and goals developed by a workgroup of subject matter experts.

Progress in 2019

1 By December 31, 2024, have three Mental Health First Aid Trainings conducted in Hendry and Glades Counties on an annual basis.

1.1 By December 31st, 2020 committee will create a tentative schedule and tentative hosts trainings.

- The first MHFA training was held at the Hendry County Emergency Operations Center on Wednesday, March 4, 2020. The class was fully booked at 30 people. Trainers included Loreena and Richard from Golisano Children’s Hospital and Edwin Melendez from the Florida Department of Health in Hendry and Glades Counties.
- We are working with Pastor McEnzie locally to plan for another training. We are in the process of developing a tentative schedule for the rest of the year. Additionally, Edwin is beginning his certification to teach the course in Spanish as another option for those looking to take the course.
- Golisano Children’s Hospital is willing to do another training.

2 Through December 31, 2024 attend community outreach events quarterly to educate members of the community about mental health.

2.1. Attend one community outreach event per quarter.

- Lisa Sands from United Way attended the NOVA Health Fair in Clewiston 2/29/2020 and promoted the resource guide of services available locally to residents.

- Drug Free Hendry County attended Hendry County Fair and Livestock Show and promoted the resource guide of services available locally to residents.

<p>The first Youth Mental Health First Aid Training was a complete success. Thanks to Golisano Children’s hospital funding the fully booked class, we were able to get 40 people trained and certified in Youth Mental Health First Aid at no cost to each trainee. Due to the success of the training and how many people enjoyed it, we have even had a local pastor reach out to us about his congregation wanting to fund the next training so that we are able to get more people certified. A waiting list for the next training has already started and we are hoping to get another training scheduled on the books after COVID-19 settles. Also, the trainer from Golisano Children’s Hospital has showed interest in our local trainer becoming trained to teach the course in Spanish also. Once our trainer takes the certification for the Spanish course, he will be able to offer Youth Mental Health First Aid locally in both English and Spanish!</p>

Sally was able to present on Child ATV safety to our group using a fully robotic life-size ATV representing the correct size for a 9-year-old boy. The robotic ATV is the first in the state and we were lucky enough to witness it firsthand. An accomplishment of this meeting as that we are now able to schedule Sally to attend events/presentations throughout our community to educate on ATV safety for those of all ages</p>

These results demonstrate that by working together, we can have an impact on improving community health and making Hendry & Glades Counties the healthiest counties in the nation to live, learn, work, and play.

By working together, we can have a significant impact on the community's health by improving where we live, work and play. These efforts will allow us to realize the vision of a healthier Hendry & Glades Counties.
