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Introduction

This is the annual review report for the year 2019 encompassed by the 2017-2020 Pasco County Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). The activities and collaborative efforts of the Florida Department of Health in Pasco County and community partners are reflected in this report. This document will serve as a progress review of the strategies that were developed and the activities that have been implemented. While the CHIP is a community-driven and collectively owned health improvement plan, the Florida Department of Health in Pasco County is charged with providing administrative support, tracking and collecting data, and preparing the annual review report.

The CHIP coordinator for DOH-Pasco checks in quarterly with all focus area leaders via phone, email, or meetings to obtain updates and revisions for the respective action plans. All progress is shared at Community Health Collaborative meetings, the biannual reporting meetings for the Pasco CHIP.

A significant accomplishment for 2019 is the completion of our community health assessment. For this CHA cycle, we had the fantastic opportunity to partner with other local counties and non-profit hospitals to complete a collaborative CHA. Together, we were able to broaden the reach of our data collection efforts, especially for the community survey. This collaborative approach to the CHA serves all parties involved by producing a more robust and diverse data set for the CHA, along with better informed development of our respective community health improvement plans.

Overview of CHIP and Annual Review Meeting

In September 2016, the Florida Department of Health in Pasco County assembled a CHIP planning team that participated in Collective Impact meetings. During the Collective Impact meetings, subject matter experts from a diverse group of partners conducted the local public health system assessment and the forces of change assessment. Individually, the assessments yielded in-depth analyses of factors and forces that impact population health. Taken together, the assessment findings contribute to a comprehensive view of health and quality of life in Pasco County.

Since implementation of the CHIP, the DOH-Pasco has taken a lead in tracking the implementation and updates of the plan. DOH-Pasco maintains regular communication with community partners to ensure data updates and progress on plan objectives.

In February 2019, DOH-Pasco hosted the annual CHIP review meeting. The meeting was well-attended by community partners and key stakeholders for the CHIP. Progress reports and updates were provided by DOH-Pasco and CHIP partners responsible for objectives. Educational presentations were provided on emerging local public health issues, vaping and hepatitis A. DOH-Pasco staff also shared about progress toward the next community health assessment, an innovative collaboration among DOH-Pasco, other county health departments, and local non-profit hospitals. Please refer to appendices for meeting materials.

In July 2019, DOH-Pasco, along with partner agencies, hosted a prioritization meeting to engage the community and key stakeholders in identifying priority areas for our upcoming 2020-2023 CHIP. The meeting had over 120 attendees who learned about the data collected during the CHA and got to vote on the health areas that were most pertinent for our community. Mental health, substance use, nutrition, access to care, and infectious disease prevention emerged as top priority areas. Attendees were also engaged in break-out discussions to determine what current resources are available in our community, as well as needs and gaps in services.

Strategic Issue Area #4: Healthy Babies

Infant mortality is a key measure of population health and the rate of infant deaths in Pasco County is equivalent to the overall rate for the entire state of Florida (6.1% per 1,000 live births). The Healthy Babies initiative is a collaboration of community partners who are working together to address health disparities and improve the overall health of women of child-bearing age, pregnant women, and their babies. The Pasco County Community Health Collaborative is focusing on promoting preconceptual and interconceptual health, promoting baby spacing for 18 months, and increasing awareness of the benefits of long-acting reversible contraceptives (LARC). By improving education and increasing awareness of healthy behaviors, we hope to achieve a reduction in premature births, reduction of substance-exposed newborns, and decreased rates of infant mortality.

Progress in 2019

In 2019, DOH-Pasco, along with CHIP partners, continued work on the final outstanding objectives for the 2017-2020 CHIP. We achieved great success with our Healthy Babies objectives, far exceeding our targets for delivering education on safe sleep, distributing Pack N' Plays to promote a safe sleep environment, and improving knowledge on safe sleep practices. We have also made significant progress toward opening additional housing for people experiencing homelessness in Pasco County. A facility was purchased in 2019 and is currently being renovated to accommodate families. It is expected to open in the Fall of 2020.

We also made significant progress toward our new community health assessment and community health improvement plan. Over the course of 2019, we collaborated with other county health departments (Hillsborough, Polk, and Pinellas) and local non-profit hospitals (BayCare, AdventHealth, Moffitt, Lakeland Regional Medical Center, and Tampa General) to complete a community health needs assessment together. All of the above-mentioned entities are required to complete a CHA and CHIP every three to five years, so we decided to do it together. We collectively formed the All4Health Collaborative to accomplish our shared goal of completing a CHA with a wider reach and more community input. In 2016, DOH-Pasco received 216 responses to our CHA community survey. In 2019, we received over 3,000 responses. Once completing the CHA process, the collaborative agreed to work on a shared CHIP objective to address one of the most prevalent needs in all four counties, mental health and substance use. The collaborative is working together to promote and provide Mental Health First Aid training in our respective communities. The training and supply costs will be covered by the collaborative for participants to reduce barriers to receive this important training.

Once our CHA results were summarized, we set about sharing this information with community partners and key stakeholders. Through this sharing process, we engaged several new partners for the upcoming 2020-2023 CHIP. To address the priority area of mental health, we connected with the Pasco Acute Care Team, a group of mental health providers and professionals providing acute care and crisis stabilization services in our community. To address another top priority area, substance use, we have partnered with the Pasco Tobacco Free Partnership and the Alliance for Substance Addiction Prevention subcommittees on Alcohol and Prescription Drugs. To address nutrition and food insecurity,

we have partnered with the Tampa Bay Network to End Hunger. We are continuing to engage community partners as we share the results of our recent CHA and work on developing our new CHIP.

How Targets Were Monitored

Progress for CHIP objectives was monitored by maintaining communication with our CHIP partners. We achieved this by attending various community meetings to obtain updates from partners and through phone calls and emails. Each objective was monitored quarterly in this fashion with respective partners. This monitoring process ensured that we keep up to date with data and progress, while also maintaining the important relationships with community partners.

Revisions

The CHIP was not revised in 2019, as nearly all of the objectives in the plan were either completed or coming to an end. We are in the process of creating a new CHIP for 2020-2023.

Why This Accomplishment is Important for Our Community		
<p>Infant mortality is a strong indicator of the health of a community reflecting the health and social systems in place. Reducing preventable infant deaths is an ongoing goal for Pasco County, as even one infant death can be devastating and painful for the community. The partners working on this goal are delighted with the interest and response of our community regarding this important issue.</p>

Why This Accomplishment is Important for Our Community		
<p>Many of our community members live paycheck-to-paycheck, where making ends meet can be a challenge. Having a new baby can be a happy and exciting time, but also expensive. This initiative helped to provide baby products that can keep baby comfortable and safe during sleep, giving parents and caregivers peace of mind. Many of the families that benefited from receiving a Pack N' Play or sleep sack may not have been otherwise able to afford these products or may have resorted to less-safe sleep practices. The products also came with education about safe sleep and support from the partners involved in this objective.</p>		

Conclusion

The CHIP serves as a roadmap for a continuous health improvement process for the local public health system by providing a framework for the chosen strategic issue areas. It is not intended to be an exhaustive and static document. We will evaluate progress on an ongoing basis through quarterly CHIP implementation reports and quarterly discussion with community partners. We will conduct annual reviews and revisions based on input from partners and create CHIP annual reports by February of each year. The CHIP will continue to change and evolve over time as new information and insight emerge at the local, state, and national levels.

As this CHIP comes to a close, we are eagerly looking forward to working with our community partners on our upcoming 2020-2023 CHIP. By working together, we can have a significant impact on the community's health by improving where we live, work and play. These efforts will allow us to realize the vision of a healthier Pasco County.
