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Introduction

This is the annual report for the 2019-2024 Washington County Community Health Assessment (CHA) and the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). The activities and collaborative efforts of the Florida Department of Health in Washington County and community partners will be reflected within the report. This document will serve as a progress review of the strategies that were developed and the activities that have been implemented. While the CHIP is a community driven and collectively owned health improvement plan, the Florida Department of Health in Washington County is charged with providing administrative support, tracking and collecting data, and preparing the annual review report.

The health status of a community plays a large role in social and economic prosperity; hence it is important that a community strives to continually improve and maintain its health. Government agencies (city, county, state) may provide health services; however, successful health programs require an active partnership between all community agencies. Community health improvement planning is a long-term, systematic effort that addresses health problems on the basis of the results of community health assessment activities and the community health improvement process. The resulting Community Health Improvement Plan is used by health and other government, educational and human service agencies, in collaboration with community partners, to set priorities and coordinate and target resources. A CHIP is critical for developing policies and defining actions to target efforts that promote health. It defines the vision for the health of the community through a collaborative process and addresses the strengths, weaknesses, challenges, and opportunities that exist in the community in order to improve the health status of that community.

To develop the CHA, we used the Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships (MAPP) model. The MAPP model is made up of four assessments that help identify public health issues in our community:

Community Health Status Assessment: This explains the health standing of our community. It helped us identify our key community health problems by reviewing data about health conditions, quality of life and risk factors in the community.

Community Themes and Strengths Assessment: Information was collected from three face-to-face focus groups that included citizens from the Council on Aging in Caryville, students from the Florida Panhandle Technical College, and members of the Hispanic Community. A community survey was also distributed throughout Washington County from August 2018 – March 2019 with over 250 people responding. The data helped us learn what issues are important to our community, how the quality of life is seen in our community and what resources our community has that can be used to improve health.

Local Public Health System Assessment: Washington County stakeholders met in a face-to-face meeting on February 28, 2019 to review and score each of the ten essential public health

services. Participants were asked questions about each essential service and scored each service using recommended scoring levels provided in the assessment instrument. The data helped us learn how well public health services are being provided to our community and the performance and abilities of our public health system.

Forces of Change Assessment: Information was collected from community leaders, which helped us learn what is happening or could happen that affects the health of our community and what dangers, or opportunities are exposed by these occurrences.

After the MAPP assessments were completed in March 2019, DOH-Washington created the 2019 CHA document. The CHA was then **edited by the Washington Community Health Improvement Partnership (WCHIP) Assessment Teams**. Afterward, the document was reviewed by the entire WCHIP which is comprised of multiple community organizations and citizens of Washington County. The responses provided by the WCHIP shaped the final CHA document. DOH Washington invited the ongoing WCHIP to act as a platform and steering committee for the Washington County Community Health Assessment (CHA) process, which began in July 2018.

Some major findings from the Washington **Community Health Status Assessment** included:

Washington County's population is 54.2% male and 45.8% female. The median age of 42 years, Washington County has a similar age composition to the state of Florida (median age: 42.1 years). Washington County also has a similar proportion of its population in the 45-64 age group and a smaller portion in the <5 age group in comparison to Florida.

Race & Ethnicity

Roughly eighty-one percent (80.6%) of the population is White, fifteen percent (14.9%) are Black or African American, alone and four percent (3.8%) are Hispanic or Latino. The remaining less than one percent (.7%) are represented by individuals classified as "other races or ethnicities". Washington County has a foreign-born population of approximately three percent (2.8%).⁵

Families in Poverty

Washington County has a larger portion of people and families living in poverty in comparison to the state of Florida. The percentage of elementary and middle school students eligible for free/reduced lunch is 66.8% compared to Florida's rate of 59.8%.

21.1% of Washington County residents lived below poverty level.

Using this CHA as a guide, the **Community Health Improvement Plan** (CHIP) was created. The CHIP is used to address health concerns and issues reported in the CHA. There has not been an annual review since this is a new CHA and CHIP.

Overview of the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP)

In April of 2019, the Department of Health in Washington County convened the CHIP Planning Team. The Florida Department of Health in Washington County and community health partners met together for the purpose of evaluating the health status of the citizens of the Washington County area in order to develop health improvement interventions. The goal of these partners was to develop and implement comprehensive, community-based health promotion and wellness programs in the Washington County area and provide a forum where members may join together to plan, share resources, and implement strategies and programs to address the health care needs of citizens.

The NACCHO MAPP model for community health planning was used, which provides a strategic approach to community health improvement. This model utilizes six distinct phases:

1. Partnership development and organizing for success
2. Visioning
3. The Four MAPP assessments
 - Community Health Status Assessment
 - Community Strength and Themes Assessment
 - Local Public Health System Assessment
 - Forces of Change Assessment
4. Identifying strategic issues
5. Formulating goals and strategies
6. Action (program planning, implementation, and evaluation)

To select health priorities, the WCHIP reviewed key findings from the four MAPP assessments at a meeting on April 23, 2019. The WCHIP discussed quantitative data (e.g., disease mortality rates, health behaviors, factors in the physical environment, quality of life indicators) and the top health issues identified through focus groups and community surveys. Then, attendees provided feedback through a voting system that allowed them to answer the question: “Of all the issues

discussed today, which three to five issues do you think are the most important?”

The meeting attendees voted for the following priority issues to be addressed and targeted for improvement in the CHIP:

- **Health** (Obesity and Chronic Diseases)
- **Substance Abuse** (Drug Use)
- **Mental Health** (Availability and Resources)
- **Communication** (Resources, Dissemination, Keeping Public Informed)

The members of WCHIP held four workgroups in the month of May: one for each of the priority areas identified. Each workgroup had a leader that began the meetings with a summary of the findings of the community health assessment and a recap of the health issue(s) to be addressed in each workgroup. Next, the leader facilitated a brief discussion of goals, objectives, and strategies in order to create draft action plans to present at the next larger WCHIP meeting in June. At the June 3, 2019 larger WCHIP meeting the draft action plans were shared and additional brainstorming was completed in order to identify potential resources, lead persons/organizations, measures for tracking progress of a strategy, current performance levels, and targets for each strategy.

The goal of the CHIP is to not only outline health issues, future action steps, and strategies to improve the health of Washington County, but also to align with already existing state, national objectives and other local programs, projects and organizations. The WCHIP made efforts to align Washington County with state and national objectives by referring to the Florida State Health Improvement Plan and the Healthy People 2020 initiative.

The service is always available, and cloud based, so as long as a person can get a phone signal they can speak with someone. 211 is a free human information resource, with the only recording at the beginning letting you know it may be recorded for training purposes. However, you would always speak to a human being, it's always confidential and they do not ask your name or address. *Each individual agency must authorize information and give 211 consent to share it. They collect Information on housing, utilities, childcare, food pantry's, churches, etc. specific to your location and home. This is not a free advertising program, unless the activity offers a free or sliding scale fee. Goal is to speak with someone in less than 60 seconds currently at 82 seconds. *They have a 211 specialist for Veterans' assistance that is previous military and can more easily identify needs specific to veterans. Veteran Specialist covers Escambia, Jackson, Okaloosa, Walton, Holmes, Washington, Bay & Gulf Required criteria for 211 is language translation service Summer Break Spot program – provides a free prepared food source all summer long. Pays enough that a church or school won't lose money, they won't make money but they also won't lose money. Google the program and learn how to become a sponsor.
