



Florida Arbovirus Surveillance Week 21: May 19 - 25, 2013

Arbovirus surveillance in Florida includes endemic mosquito-borne viruses such as West Nile virus (WNV), Eastern equine encephalitis virus (EEEV), St. Louis encephalitis virus (SLEV), and Highlands J virus (HJV) and exotic viruses such as dengue virus (DENV) and California encephalitis group viruses (CEV). Malaria, a non-viral mosquito-borne disease is also included. During the period of May 19 - 25, 2013 the following arboviral activity was recorded in Florida:

DENV activity: No locally acquired dengue cases have been reported in 2013.

EEEV activity: No human cases of EEEV infection were reported this week. Five sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to EEEV this week in Orange and Walton Counties. No horse cases of EEEV infection were reported this week. In 2013, positive samples from two human, three birds, seven equines, and 22 sentinel chickens have been received from 13 counties.

WNV activity: No human cases of WNV infection were reported this week. No horse cases of WNV infection were reported this week. No sentinel chickens tested positive this week for antibodies to WNV. In 2013, positive samples from 36 sentinel chickens have been received from two counties.

SLEV activity: No sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to SLEV. In 2013, two positive samples have been received from two counties.

HJV activity: Two sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to HJV this week in Bay and Seminole Counties. In 2013, four positive samples have been received from three counties.

Advisories/Alerts: Hillsborough and Levy counties are currently under a mosquito-borne illness advisory. No other counties are currently under mosquito-borne illness advisory or alert.

2013 Human Case Summary*

EEEV Infection Acquired in Florida: Two human cases of EEEV infection with onset in January (1) and March (1) have been reported in 2013 in a Levy (1) and Hillsborough (1) Counties resident.

Imported Dengue: Thirty-four cases of dengue with onset in 2013 have been reported in individuals with travel history to a dengue endemic country in the two weeks prior to onset. Countries of origin were: Angola, Brazil (2), The Caribbean, Columbia (3), Costa Rica, Dominican Republic (4), Haiti (2), Indonesia, Jamaica (4), Nigeria, Philippines, Puerto Rico (12), and Saint Martin. Counties reporting cases were: Brevard, Broward (2), Clay, Duval, Lee, Miami-Dade (12), Orange (7), Osceola (2), Palm Beach (5), St. Lucie, and Volusia. Five of the cases were reported in non-Florida residents.

In 2013, 24 of the 34 cases of dengue reported in Florida have been serotyped by PCR. Additional serotyping and strain typing are being conducted.



Imported Malaria: Sixteen cases of malaria with onset in 2013 have been reported. Countries of origin were: Democratic Republic of the Congo, Guinea, Ghana (2), Guyana (2), Haiti (5), Kenya, Nigeria, Sierra Leone (2), and Solomon Islands. Counties reporting cases were: Hillsborough (3), Lee, Miami-Dade (5), Orange (3), Palm Beach (2), Pinellas, and Seminole.


Fourteen cases (88%) were diagnosed with *Plasmodium falciparum*, Two (12%) with *Plasmodium vivax*.

Veterinary Cases

No horses were reported testing positive for EEEV this week.



Veterinary WNV Disease in Florida, May 2012-2013




Sentinel Chickens

The table below is for the reporting of confirmatory laboratory results from this week. Some of the samples were collected at earlier dates. The date of collection is recorded for samples collected on that day along with the total number of positives and the corresponding seroconversion rate for the week the sample was collected.



Dead Birds



The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) collects reports of dead birds, which can be an indication of arbovirus circulation in an area. This week, 13 reports representing 48 dead birds, including 2 crows and 5 raptors were received from 10 counties.

In 2013, 447 reports representing a total of 1502 dead birds (11 crow, 7 jays, 81 raptors, 15 doves) were received from 43 of Florida's 67 counties. Please note that FWC collects reports of birds that have died from a variety of causes, not only arboviruses. Dead birds should be reported to www.myfwc.com/bird/

In addition, dengue and malaria tallies may also include suspect cases.
