Escambia, Fla.—The Florida Department of Health in Escambia County (DOH-Escambia) is monitoring rabies among wild animals in the area. This is in response to a single confirmed case of rabies in a bat that was found in Tippin Park on Tippin Ave and John Carroll Dr. in Escambia County on Thursday May 16, 2024. All residents and visitors should be aware that rabies may be currently present in the wild animal population.

People and domestic animals should always avoid physical contact with wild animals (e.g., raccoons, bats, foxes, skunks, otters, bobcats, coyotes), which carry a higher risk of human exposure and a need for rabies post-exposure treatment. If you are exposed to rabies, receiving appropriate treatment after exposure will protect you from the risk of rabies.

Take the following precautions to prevent rabies exposure:

- Immunize your pets and livestock based on your veterinarian's recommended schedule.
- Keep pets under direct supervision and on a leash, and keep livestock secured on your property. If an animal bites your pet or livestock, seek veterinary assistance for the animal immediately and contact Escambia County Animal Welfare at 850-595-0097.
- Avoid contact with wild or stray animals. Do not handle, feed, or unintentionally attract
 them with outdoor pet food, open garbage cans, or other sources of food. If you have
 been bitten or scratched by a wild or domestic animal, seek medical attention, and report
 the injury to DOH-Escambia by calling 850-595-6700.
- Never adopt wild animals or bring them into your home; instead contact a <u>licensed</u> wildlife rehabilitator.
- Prevent wildlife, including <u>bats</u>, from entering living quarters or occupied spaces in homes, schools, and other similar areas where they might come in contact with people and pets.
