

Florida Arbovirus Surveillance Week 13: March 25-31, 2018

Arbovirus surveillance in Florida includes endemic mosquito-borne viruses such as West Nile virus (WNV), Eastern equine encephalitis virus (EEEV), and St. Louis encephalitis virus (SLEV), as well as exotic viruses such as dengue virus (DENV), chikungunya virus (CHIKV) and California encephalitis group viruses (CEV). Malaria, a parasitic mosquito-borne disease is also included. During the period of March 25-31, 2018, the following arboviral activity was recorded in Florida.

WNV activity: No human cases of WNV infection were reported this week. No horses with WNV infection were reported this week. One sentinel chicken tested positive for antibodies to WNV this week in Hillsborough County. In 2018, positive samples from nineteen sentinel chickens have been reported from five counties.

SLEV activity: No human cases of SLEV infection were reported this week. No sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to SLEV this week. In 2018, there have been no positive samples reported.

EEEV activity: No human cases of EEEV infection were reported this week. No horses with EEEV infection were reported this week. One sentinel chicken tested positive for antibodies to EEEV this week in Walton County. In 2018, positive samples from eight horses, one emu, one emu flock, and six sentinel chickens have been reported from eleven counties.

International Travel-Associated Dengue Fever Cases: No cases of dengue fever were reported this week in persons that had international travel. In 2018, one travel-associated case has been reported.

Dengue Fever Cases Acquired in Florida: No cases of locally acquired dengue fever were reported this week. In 2018, no cases of locally acquired dengue fever have been reported.

International Travel-Associated Chikungunya Fever Cases: No cases of chikungunya fever were reported this week in persons that had international travel. In 2018, one travel-associated case has been reported.

Chikungunya Fever Cases Acquired in Florida: No cases of locally acquired chikungunya fever were reported this week. In 2018, no cases of locally acquired chikungunya fever have been reported.

International Travel-Associated Zika Fever Cases: One case of Zika fever was reported this week in a person that had international travel. In 2018, 24 cases have been reported.

Zika Fever Cases Acquired in Florida: No cases of locally acquired Zika fever were reported this week. In 2018, no cases of locally acquired Zika fever have been reported.

Advisories/Alerts: Levy County is currently under a mosquito-borne illness alert. No other counties are currently under mosquito-borne illness advisory or alert.

There are no areas of ongoing, active Zika transmission in Florida. There is a Level 2 (Alert) Travel Health Notice from the CDC for multiple countries in the Caribbean, Central and South America, Mexico, Cape Verde, Southeast Asia, and Pacific Islands related to Zika virus transmission and an association with poor pregnancy outcomes. Pregnant women should consider postponing travel to these areas. There is also a Level 2 Travel Health Notice for Brazil and a Level 1 Travel Health Notice for Sri Nigeria related to the transmission of yellow fever virus. There is also a Level 1 Travel Health Notice for Sri

2018 Human Case Summary*

International Travel-Associated Chikungunya Fever Cases: One case of chikungunya fever with onset in 2018 has been reported in an individual with travel history to a chikungunya endemic country in the two weeks prior to onset. Country of origin was: Brazil. County reporting the case was: Orange.

International Travel-Associated Dengue Fever Cases: One case of dengue fever with onset in 2018 has been reported in an individual with travel history to a dengue endemic country in the two weeks prior to onset. Country of origin was: Cuba. County reporting the case was: Miami-Dade. In 2018, one case of dengue reported in Florida has been serotyped by PCR. Additional serotyping and strain typing are being conducted.

International Travel-Associated Zika Fever Cases: In 2018, twenty-four cases of Zika fever have been reported in individuals with travel history to a country or area experiencing Zika virus activity. Countries of origin were: Brazil, Brazil/Haiti, Brazil/Mexico, Cuba (9), Cuba/Mexico, Guatemala, Haiti (4), Honduras (2), Puerto Rico, and Venezuela (3). Counties reporting cases were: Broward, Collier (8), Hernando, Lee, Miami-Dade (7), Orange (3), Osceola (2), and Palm Beach. Two cases were reported in non-Florida residents. Florida is monitoring a total of 16 pregnant women in 2018.


International Travel-Associated Malaria Cases: Eight cases of malaria with onset in 2018 have been reported. Countries of origin were: Haiti, India, Kenya, Nigeria (3), and Togo (2). Counties reporting cases were: Broward, Hillsborough (2), Miami-Dade (4), and Orange. One case was reported in a non-Florida resident.

Six cases (75%) were diagnosed with *Plasmodium falciparum*. One case (13%) was diagnosed with *Plasmodium vivax*. One case (13%) was diagnosed with *Plasmodium ovale*.

Veterinary Cases*

*Veterinary cases are reported by date of onset. Only mammalian veterinary cases are included in the graphs.

No horses with EEEV or WNV infection were reported this week.




Sentinel Chickens*




The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) collects reports of dead birds, which can be an indication of arbovirus circulation in an area. This week, ten reports representing a total of twenty-one dead birds including two raptors, were received from seven counties.


In 2018, 98 reports representing a total of 241 dead birds (4 jays, 28 raptors, 3 doves) were received from 32 of Florida's 67 counties. Please note that FWC collects reports of birds that have died from a variety of causes, not only arboviruses. Dead birds should be reported to <u>www.myfwc.com/bird/</u>.

Case tallies included in the weekly Florida arbovirus surveillance report include confirmed and probable cases for EEE, WNV infection, SLE, dengue, chikungunya, and malaria by date of onset. Suspect cases are not included. Activity is mapped by county of exposure rather than county of residence. Case definitions being used in Florida are consistent with national criteria provided by the Council of State and Territorial Epidemiologists (CSTE) and may be viewed at: http://www.floridahealth.gov/diseases-and-conditions/disease-reporting-and-management/disease-reporting-and-surveillance/index.html. Case tallies reported by CDC do not include suspect cases and cases are reported by patient state of residence rather than where the exposure occurred. Data is provided by county health departments, Department of Health Bureau of Public Health Laboratories, Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, mosquito control agencies, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, medical providers and veterinarians. Equine cases are provided by the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.
