

# Florida Arbovirus Surveillance Week 19: May 5-11, 2019

Arbovirus surveillance in Florida includes endemic mosquito-borne viruses such as West Nile virus (WNV), Eastern equine encephalitis virus (EEEV), and St. Louis encephalitis virus (SLEV), as well as exotic viruses such as dengue virus (DENV), chikungunya virus (CHIKV) and California encephalitis group viruses (CEV). Malaria, a parasitic mosquito-borne disease is also included. During the period of May 5-11, 2019, the following arboviral activity was recorded in Florida.

**WNV** activity: No human cases of WNV infection were reported this week. No horses with WNV infection were reported this week. No sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to WNV this week in. In 2019, one horse and 12 sentinel chickens have been reported from eight counties.

**SLEV activity:** No human cases of SLEV infection were reported this week. No sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to SLEV this week. In 2019, no positive samples have been reported.

**EEEV activity:** No human cases of EEEV infection were reported this week. Two horses with EEEV infection were reported this week in Polk and Putnam counties. Four sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to EEEV this week in Bay and Walton counties. In 2019, ten horses, one emu, and 29 sentinel chickens have been reported from 14 counties.

**International Travel-Associated Dengue Fever Cases:** Two cases of dengue fever were reported this week in persons that had international travel. In 2019, 27 travel-associated cases have been reported.

**Dengue Fever Cases Acquired in Florida:** No cases of locally acquired dengue fever were reported this week. In 2019, no cases of locally acquired dengue fever have been reported.

**International Travel-Associated Chikungunya Fever Cases:** No cases of chikungunya fever were reported this week in persons that had international travel. In 2019, two travel-associated cases have been reported.

**Chikungunya Fever Cases Acquired in Florida:** No cases of locally acquired chikungunya fever were reported this week. In 2019, no cases of locally acquired chikungunya fever have been reported.

**International Travel-Associated Zika Fever Cases:** Four cases of Zika fever were reported this week in persons that had international travel. In 2019, 19 travel-associated cases have been reported.

**Zika Fever Cases Acquired in Florida:** No cases of locally acquired Zika fever were reported this week. In 2019, no cases of locally acquired Zika fever have been reported.

**Advisories/Alerts**: Bay, Calhoun, and Walton counties are currently under a mosquito-borne illness advisory. No other counties are currently under mosquito-borne illness advisory or alert.

There are no areas of ongoing, active Zika transmission in Florida. ## 2019 Human Case Summary\*

**International Travel-Associated Chikungunya Fever Cases:** Two cases of chikungunya fever with onset in 2019 have been reported in individuals with travel history to a chikungunya endemic country in the two weeks prior to onset. Countries of origin were: Brazil and Thailand. Counties reporting cases were: Orange and Palm Beach.

International Travel-Associated Dengue Fever Cases: Twenty-seven cases of dengue fever with onset in 2019 have been reported in individuals with travel history to a dengue endemic country in the two weeks prior to onset. Countries of origin were: Central America/Mexico, Colombia, Cuba (17), Honduras, Jamaica (4), Mexico, and Venezuela (2). Counties reporting cases were: Broward (5), Hillsborough, Lake, Lee, Miami-Dade (16), Orange, Palm Beach, and Pinellas. One case was reported in a non-Florida resident. In 2019, 21 cases of dengue reported in Florida have been serotyped by PCR. Additional serotyping and strain typing are being conducted.


International Travel-Associated Zika Fever Cases: In 2019, 19 cases of Zika fever have been reported in individuals with travel history to a country or area experiencing Zika virus activity. Countries of origin were: Brazil, Colombia, Cuba (2), Guatemala (4), Haiti (6), Honduras, Jamaica, Nicaragua, Philippines, and Venezuela. Counties reporting cases were: Broward (2), Collier, Hillsborough, Indian River, Miami-Dade (9), Orange (4), and Palm Beach. One case was reported in a non-Florida resident. Florida is monitoring a total of nine pregnant women in 2019.

International Travel-Associated Malaria Cases: Ten cases of malaria with onset in 2019 have been reported. Countries of origin were: Angola, Congo, Democratic Republic of the Congo (2), Ivory Coast, Kenya, Nigeria (2), Sudan, and Uganda. Counties reporting cases were: Broward, Hillsborough (2), Miami-Dade (2), Orange, Pasco, and Pinellas (3). All ten cases were diagnosed with *Plasmodium falciparum*.


# **Veterinary Cases\***

#### Veterinary WNV Disease in Florida, May 2018-2019




#### **Sentinel Chickens\***


Four sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to EEEV this week in Bay and Walton counties.

#### **Dead Birds**


The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) collects reports of dead birds, which can be an indication of arbovirus circulation in an area. This week, nine reports representing a total of 20 dead birds, including one crow, three jays, and four raptors, were received from eight counties.


In 2019, 174 reports representing a total of 292 dead birds (9 crows, 6 jays, 46 raptors, and 8 doves) were received from 37 of Florida's 67 counties. Please note that FWC collects reports of birds that have died from a variety of causes, not only arboviruses. Case tallies included in the weekly Florida arbovirus surveillance report include confirmed and probable cases for EEE, WNV infection, SLE, dengue, chikungunya, and malaria by date of onset. Suspect cases are not included. Activity is mapped by county of exposure rather than county of residence. Case tallies reported by CDC do not include suspect cases and cases are reported by patient state of residence rather than where the exposure occurred. Data is provided by county health departments, Department of Health Bureau of Public Health Laboratories, Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, mosquito control agencies, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, medical providers and veterinarians. Equine cases are provided by the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.
