Greeting

- Greeter welcomes you and gives you a form
- •You fill in your form while waiting in line

Dispensing

•A Screener reviews your form

Medication

•A Dispenser gives you your medication and instructions Exit


An Exit Monitor will double-check your medication
You leave the POD

Complete the form

How does medication dispensing work?

You will receive a Medication Screening Form

- Complete the form while you wait in line
- List all <u>LOCAL</u> household members for whom you are picking up medication, and complete the questions for each person
- If you are a hotel guest traveling without your family, you do not need to get medication for household members who live elsewhere



Medication information

How does medication dispensing work?



You will receive one bottle of medication for each household member. Each bottle has enough medication for one person for 10 days.



Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)



Who is considered a head of household?



A head of household is any person responsible for picking up medication for all of the people listed on the **Medication Screening Form**.
