


Q3. To which grade levels are your pipeline programs targeted?













FSTAR- provides periodic monitoring, academic interventions, and monthly communications throughout undergraduate training
Florida State University	Yes	Grade monitoring is conducted every four weeks, intervention steps taking to improve grades, then second look every nine weeks when report cards are received. Intervention strategies include before, during, and after-school tutoring. In addition, we intervene by providing additional worksheets for students to reinforce concepts not learned.

Medical School	Challenges
Florida Atlantic University	Money, diversified revenue streams to support pipeline programs, committed partners, medical school and district buyin, time, lack of fulltime personnel
Florida International University	Financial support; Staff and faculty time; Coordination with other HWCOM activities; Meeting with and engaging community partners; Lack of resources from community partners; Trying to increase parental involvement
Florida State University	Supplemental funding of programs and funding that can be used to provide incentives and special events for students.
Lake Erie College	The program has grown very large very rapidly, so; tracking and personal contact have been a challenge to maintaining quality.
Nova Southeastern University	Available resources are minimal; we have a robust applicant pool that is already diverse and requires a significant amount of attention already; we depend on student mentors to deliver much of the services which adversely affects their own learning; we have articulation agreements with selected colleges that help build interest from diverse areas outside of the main NSU location.
University of Central Florida	Funding for staffing and continual follow-up
University of Florida	Funding for underserved students; visibility of Pipeline programs within university and in schools/communities. The programs I describe are directed by a COM faculty member (me) but I also serve as the Director of the UF Center for Precollegiate Education and Training-- this is not only for the COM, but serves all STEM departments across campus.COM is the largest participant, but we work with ~450 research faculty annually. There are many departments that work with us to prepare health pipelines!
