



Florida Arbovirus Surveillance

Week 32: August 9-15, 2026

Arbovirus surveillance in Florida includes endemic mosquito-borne viruses such as West Nile virus (WNV), Eastern equine encephalitis virus (EEEV), and St. Louis encephalitis virus (SLEV), as well as exotic viruses such as dengue virus (DENV), chikungunya virus (CHIKV), Zika virus (ZIKV), and California encephalitis group viruses (CEV). Malaria, a parasitic mosquito-borne disease, is also included. During the period of August 9-15, 2026, the following arboviral activity was recorded in Florida.

WNV activity: No human cases of WNV infection were reported this week. No horses with WNV infection were reported this week. Six sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to WNV in Hillsborough, Pasco, Pinellas, and Walton counties. In 2026, positive samples from one symptomatic human, one asymptomatic blood donor, 46 sentinel chickens, and seven mosquito pools have been reported from 12 counties.

SLEV activity: No human cases of SLEV infection were reported this week. No sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to SLEV this week. In 2026, one sentinel chicken has been reported from one county.

EEEV activity: No human cases of EEEV infection were reported this week. Two horses with EEEV infection were reported in Hillsborough and Jackson counties. No sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to EEEV this week. In 2026, positive samples from 36 sentinel chickens and five horses have been reported from 12 counties.

International Travel-Associated Dengue: Twenty-one cases of dengue were reported this week. In 2026, 86 travel-associated dengue cases have been reported.

Dengue Cases Acquired in Florida: Sixteen cases of locally acquired dengue were reported this week. In 2026, 23 cases of locally acquired dengue, and five mosquito pools have been reported from four counties.

International Travel-Associated Chikungunya Fever Cases: Three cases of chikungunya fever were reported this week. In 2026, 50 cases of travel-associated chikungunya fever have been reported.

Chikungunya Fever Cases Acquired in Florida: No cases of locally acquired chikungunya fever were reported this week. In 2026, no cases of locally acquired chikungunya fever have been reported.

International Travel-Associated Oropouche Fever cases: No cases of Oropouche fever were reported this week. In 2026, no cases of travel-associated Oropouche fever have been reported.

International Travel-Associated Zika Fever Cases: No cases of Zika fever were reported this week. In 2026, no travel-associated Zika fever cases have been reported.

Zika Fever Cases Acquired in Florida: No cases of locally acquired Zika fever were reported this week. In 2026, no cases of locally acquired Zika fever have been reported.

Advisories/Alerts as of August 8, 2026: Alachua, Leon, Palm Beach, and Pasco counties are currently under a mosquito-borne illness advisory. Hillsborough, Miami-Dade, and Pinellas counties are currently under a mosquito-borne illness alert.

There are currently multiple travel health notices from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention related to mosquito-borne diseases.

2026 Human Case Summary

West Nile Virus Illness Acquired in Florida: In 2026, one human case of WNV illness acquired in Florida has been reported in Alachua County (May). One asymptomatic blood donor has been reported in Leon County (July).

2026 International Travel-Associated Chikungunya Cases: Fifty cases with onset in 2026 have been reported in individuals with travel history to a chikungunya-endemic area in the two weeks prior to onset. Counties reporting cases were: Alachua, Broward (2), Collier (2), Hernando, Hillsborough (8), Miami-Dade (25), Monroe (2), Okaloosa, Orange (2), Osceola, Palm Beach (4), and Pinellas. Countries of origin were Bolivia (2), Brazil (2), Cuba (38), Guyana, Nicaragua (5), Sri Lanka, and Surinam. One case was reported in a non-Florida resident.

2026 International Travel-Associated Dengue Cases: Eighty-six cases with onset in 2026 have been reported in individuals with travel to a dengue-endemic area in the two weeks prior to onset. Counties reporting cases were: Bay, Brevard, Broward (11), Duval, Hillsborough (5), Lake, Lee (4), Manatee, Miami-Dade (45), Orange (2), Osceola, Palm Beach (6), Polk, Sarasota, Seminole, St. Johns, St. Lucie (2), and Walton. Two cases were reported in non-Florida residents. In 2026, 73 cases of dengue reported in Florida have been serotyped by PCR. Please see the table below for a breakdown of cases by country of origin and serotype.

2026 Dengue Cases Acquired in Florida: In 2026, 23 cases of locally acquired dengue have been reported in Hillsborough (15), Miami-Dade (4), Palm Beach, and Pinellas (3) with onset in July (14), and August (9). Twenty-two cases have been serotyped by PCR. Please see the table below for a breakdown of cases by county and serotype.

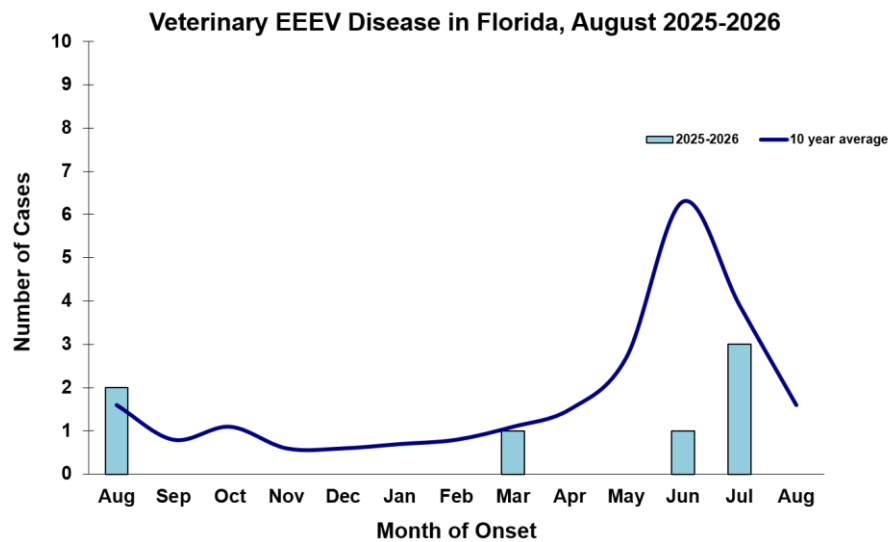
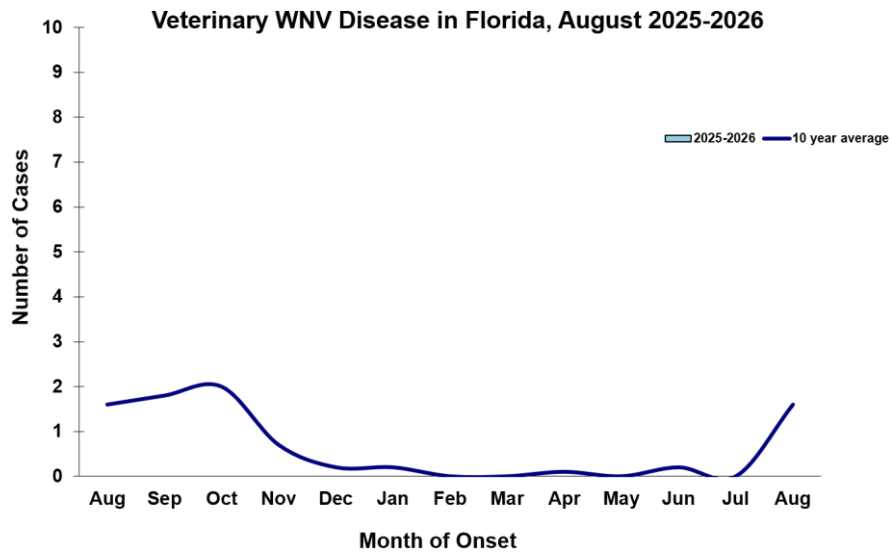
2026 International Travel-Associated Malaria Cases: Thirty cases with onset in 2026 have been reported in individuals with travel history to a malaria-endemic area. Counties reporting cases were: Alachua (2), Broward (3), Duval (5), Hernando, Hillsborough (4), Lee (2), Leon, Marion, Miami-Dade (4), Orange (2), Palm Beach, Pinellas, Polk, Seminole, and Washington. Three cases were reported in non-Florida residents. Please see the table below for a breakdown of cases by country of origin and *Plasmodium* species.

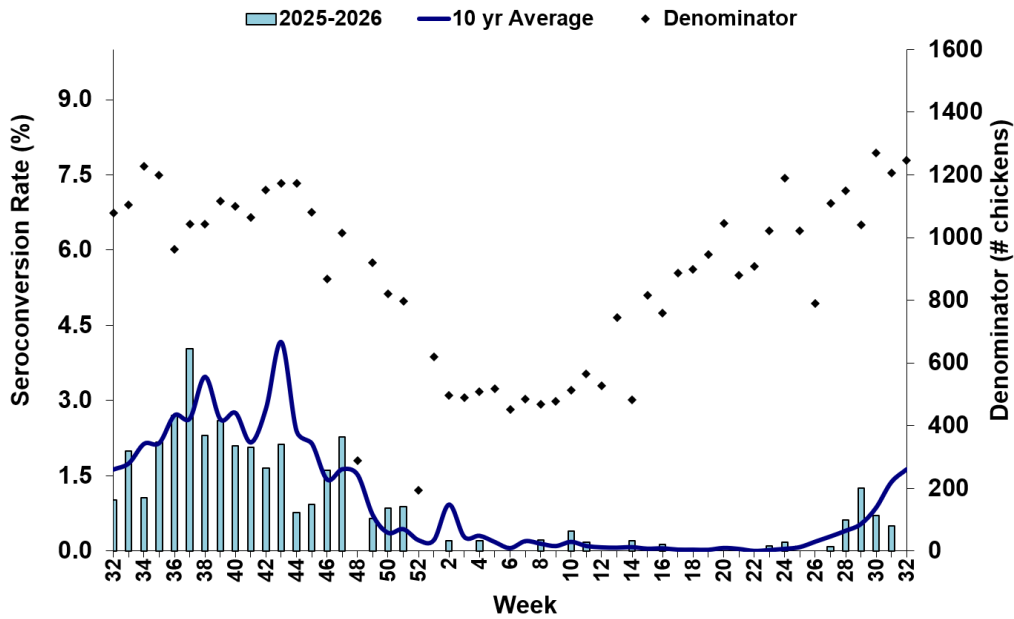
Sentinel Chickens

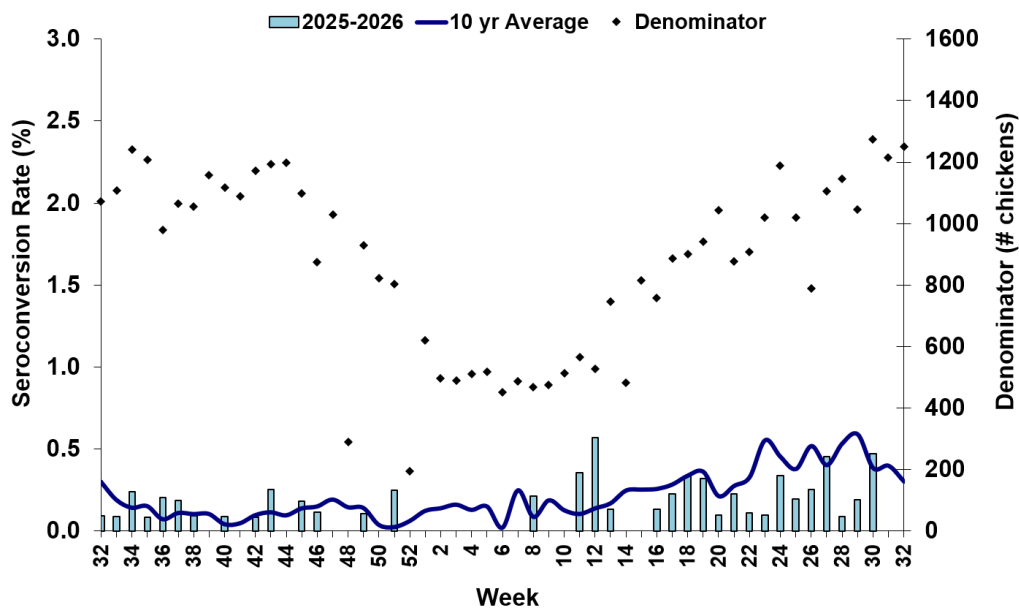
Six sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to WNV in Hillsborough, Pasco, Pinellas, and Walton counties.

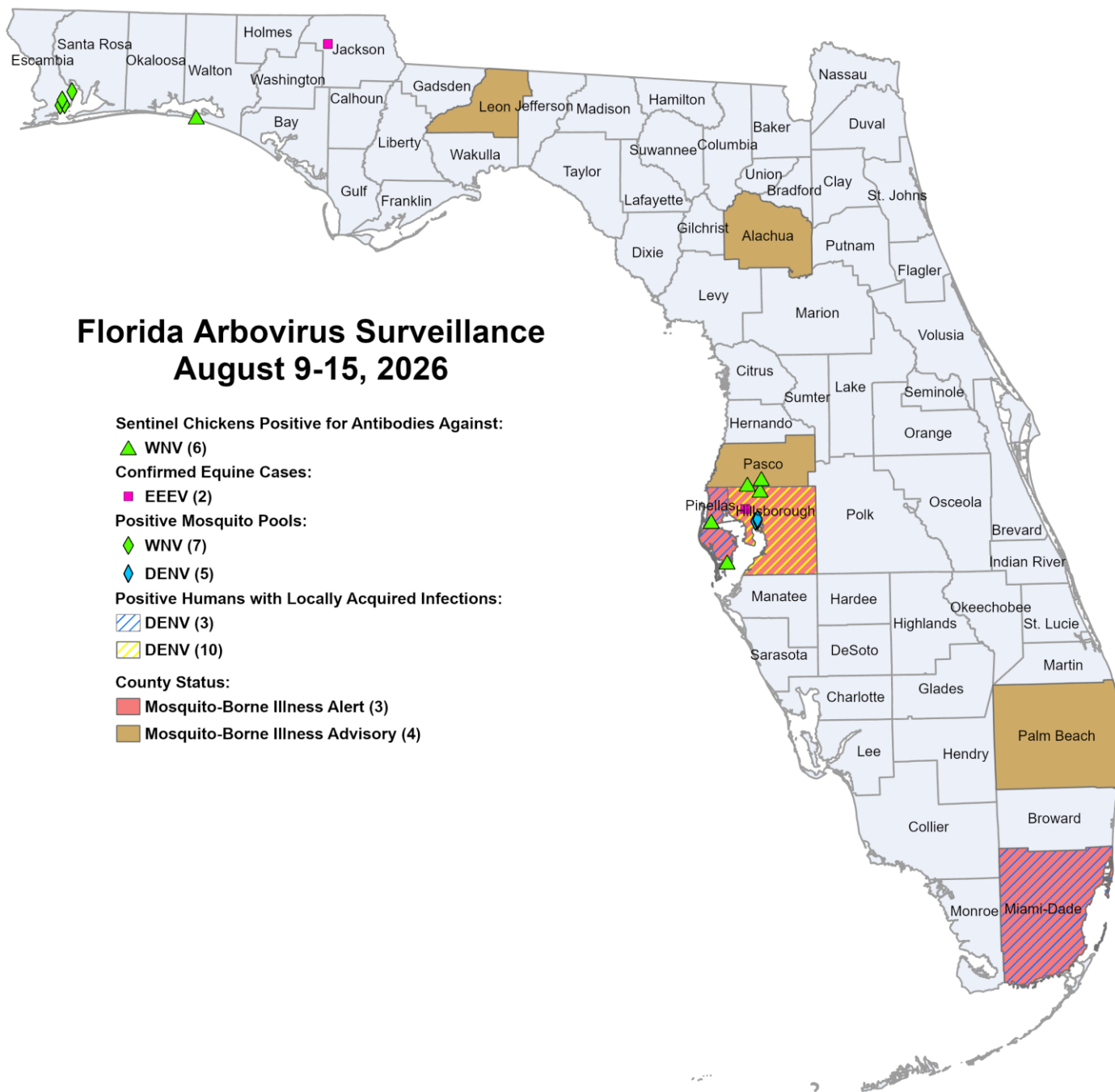
Dead Birds

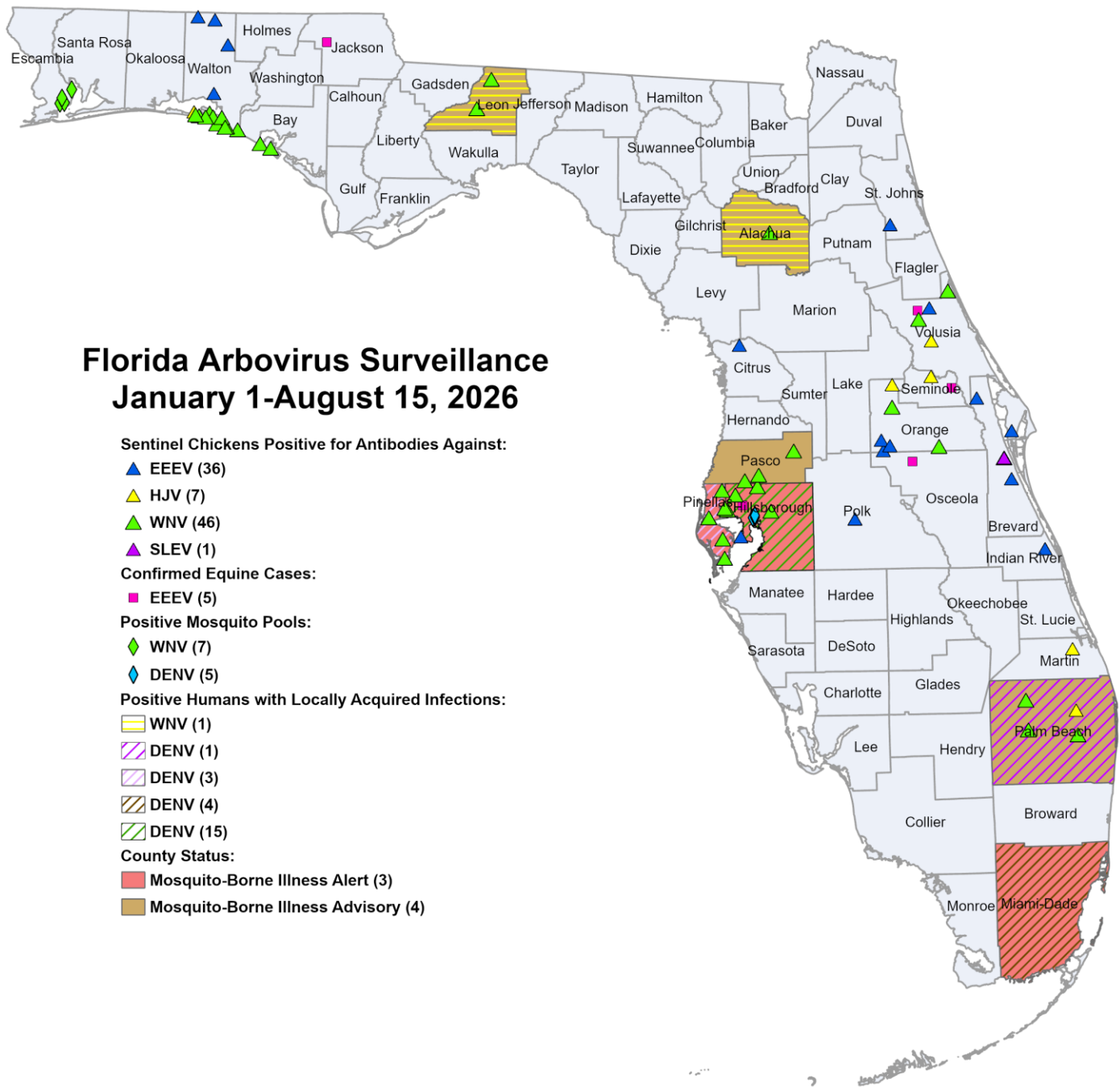
The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) collects reports of dead birds, which can be an indication of arbovirus circulation in an area. This week, 32 reports representing a total of 62 dead birds, including five crows, eight raptors, and four doves were received from 17 counties.

In 2026, 1284 reports representing a total of 3054 dead birds (60 crows, 27 jays, 380 raptors, 149 doves) were received from 52 of Florida's 67 counties.

Case tallies included in the weekly Florida arbovirus surveillance report include confirmed and probable cases for EEE, WNV infection, SLE, dengue, chikungunya, and malaria by date of onset. Suspect cases are not included. Activity is mapped by county of exposure rather than county of residence. Case definitions being used in Florida are consistent with national criteria provided by the Council of State and Territorial Epidemiologists (CSTE) and may be viewed at: www.floridahealth.gov/diseases-and-conditions/disease-reporting-and-management/disease-reporting-and-surveillance/index.html. Case tallies reported by CDC do not include suspect cases and cases are reported by patient state of residence rather than where the exposure occurred. Data is provided by county health departments, Department of Health Bureau of Public Health Laboratories, Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, mosquito control agencies, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, medical providers and veterinarians. Equine cases are provided by the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.
