

Florida Arbovirus Surveillance

Week 37: September 13-19, 2026

Arbovirus surveillance in Florida includes endemic mosquito-borne viruses such as West Nile virus (WNV), Eastern equine encephalitis virus (EEEV), and St. Louis encephalitis virus (SLEV), as well as exotic viruses such as dengue virus (DENV), chikungunya virus (CHIKV), Zika virus (ZIKV), and California encephalitis group viruses (CEV). Malaria, a parasitic mosquito-borne disease, is also included. During the period of September 13-19, 2026, the following arboviral activity was recorded in Florida.

WNV activity: No human cases of WNV infection were reported this week. No horses with WNV infection were reported this week. Forty sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to WNV in Bay, Brevard, Hillsborough, Manatee, Martin, Orange, Palm Beach, Pasco, Pinellas, Polk, Sarasota, and Sumter counties. In 2026, positive samples from three symptomatic humans, two asymptomatic blood donors, 172 sentinel chickens, one horse, and eight mosquito pools have been reported from 21 counties.

SLEV activity: No human cases of SLEV infection were reported this week. No sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to SLEV this week. In 2026, one sentinel chicken has been reported from one county.

EEEV activity: No human cases of EEEV infection were reported this week. No horses with EEEV infection were reported this week. No sentinel chickens tested positive for antibodies to EEEV this week. In 2026, positive samples from 42 sentinel chickens and seven horses have been reported from 16 counties.

International Travel-Associated Dengue: Twenty-six cases of dengue were reported this week. In 2026, 212 travel-associated dengue cases have been reported.

Dengue Cases Acquired in Florida: Thirty-eight cases of locally acquired dengue were reported this week. In 2026, 190 cases of locally acquired dengue and 17 mosquito pools have been reported from six counties.

International Travel-Associated Chikungunya Fever Cases: Six cases of chikungunya fever were reported this week. In 2026, 72 cases of travel-associated chikungunya fever have been reported.

Chikungunya Fever Cases Acquired in Florida: No cases of locally acquired chikungunya fever were reported this week. In 2026, one case of locally acquired chikungunya fever has been reported from one county.

International Travel-Associated Oropouche Fever cases: No cases of Oropouche fever were reported this week. In 2026, no cases of travel-associated Oropouche fever have been reported.

International Travel-Associated Zika Fever Cases: No cases of Zika fever were reported this week. In 2026, no travel-associated Zika fever cases have been reported.

Zika Fever Cases Acquired in Florida: No cases of locally acquired Zika fever were reported this week. In 2026, no cases of locally acquired Zika fever have been reported.

Advisories/Alerts as of August 29, 2026: Alachua, Brevard, Leon, Palm Beach, Pasco, and Walton counties are currently under a mosquito-borne illness advisory. Duval, Hillsborough, Miami-Dade, Orange, and Pinellas counties are currently under a mosquito-borne illness alert.

There are currently multiple travel health notices from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention related to mosquito-borne diseases.

2026 Human Case Summary

West Nile Virus Illness Acquired in Florida: In 2026, three human cases of WNV illness acquired in Florida have been reported in Alachua (May), Duval (August), and Walton (July) counties. Two asymptomatic blood donors have been reported in Duval (August) and Leon (July) counties.

2026 International Travel-Associated Chikungunya Cases: Seventy-two cases with onset in 2026 have been reported in individuals with travel history to a chikungunya-endemic area in the two weeks prior to onset. Counties reporting cases were: Alachua, Broward (4), Collier (2), Hernando, Hillsborough (8), Lee, Miami-Dade (42), Monroe (2), Okaloosa, Orange (3), Osceola, Palm Beach (4), Pinellas, and Seminole. Countries of origin were Bolivia (2), Brazil (2), Cameroon, Cuba (49), Guyana, Nicaragua (15), Sri Lanka, and Surinam. One case was reported in a non-Florida resident.

2026 Chikungunya Cases Acquired in Florida: One case of locally acquired chikungunya fever has been reported in Miami-Dade County with onset in August.

2026 International Travel-Associated Dengue Cases: Two hundred twelve cases with onset in 2026 have been reported in individuals with travel to a dengue-endemic area in the two weeks prior to onset. Counties reporting cases were: Alachua, Bay, Brevard (2), Broward (18), Collier (2), Duval (2), Hillsborough (12), Lake, Lee (8), Manatee, Marion, Miami-Dade (126), Monroe, Orange (5), Osceola, Palm Beach (12), Pinellas (2), Polk (4), Sarasota, Seminole (3), St. Johns, St. Lucie (6), and Walton. Three cases were reported in non-Florida residents. In 2026, 185 cases of dengue reported in Florida have been serotyped by PCR. Please see the table below for a breakdown of cases by country of origin and serotype.

2026 Dengue Cases Acquired in Florida: In 2026, 190 cases of locally acquired dengue have been reported in Hillsborough (170), Miami-Dade (7), Orange (3), Palm Beach, Pasco (2), and Pinellas (7) with onset in July (21), August (139), and September (30). One hundred seventy-one cases have been serotyped by PCR. Please see the table below for a breakdown of cases by county and serotype.

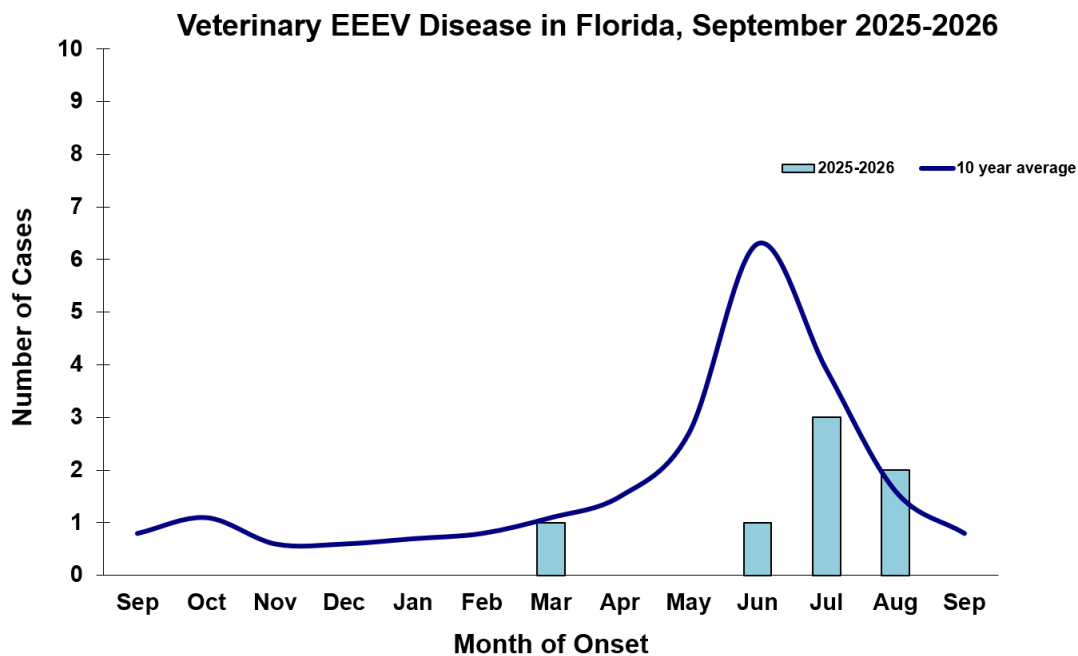
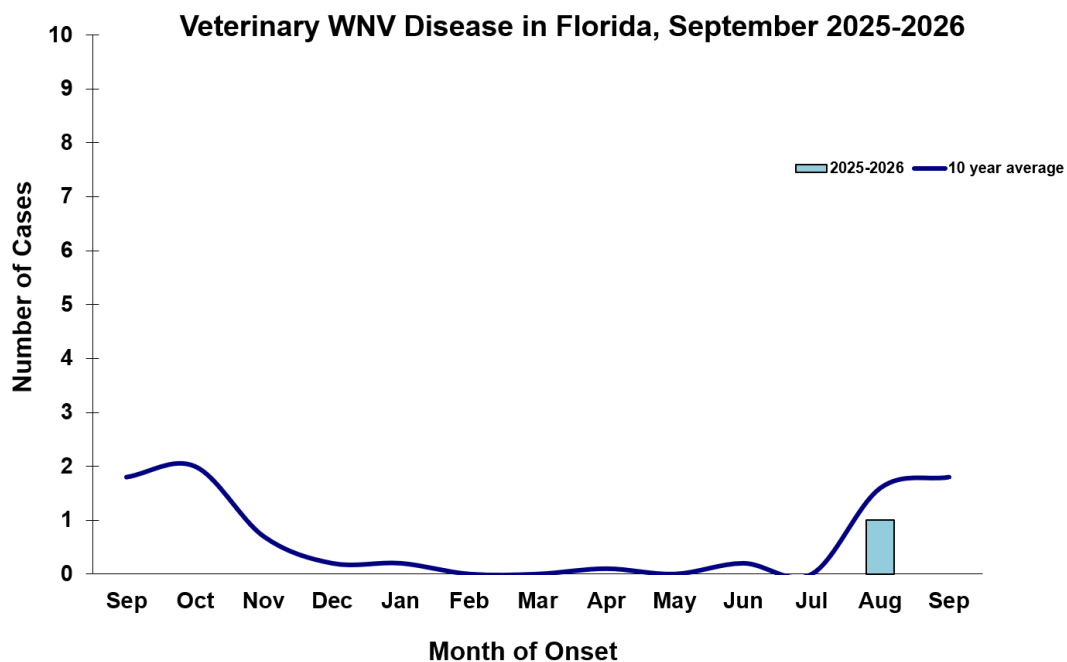

2026 International Travel-Associated Malaria Cases: Thirty-eight cases with onset in 2026 have been reported in individuals with travel history to a malaria-endemic area. Counties reporting cases were: Alachua (2), Broward (6), Duval (5), Hernando, Hillsborough (4), Lee (2), Leon, Marion, Martin, Miami-Dade (5), Orange (4), Palm Beach, Pasco, Pinellas, Polk, Seminole, and Washington. Four cases were reported in non-Florida residents. Please see the table below for a breakdown of cases by country of origin and *Plasmodium* species.

No veterinary cases were reported this week.



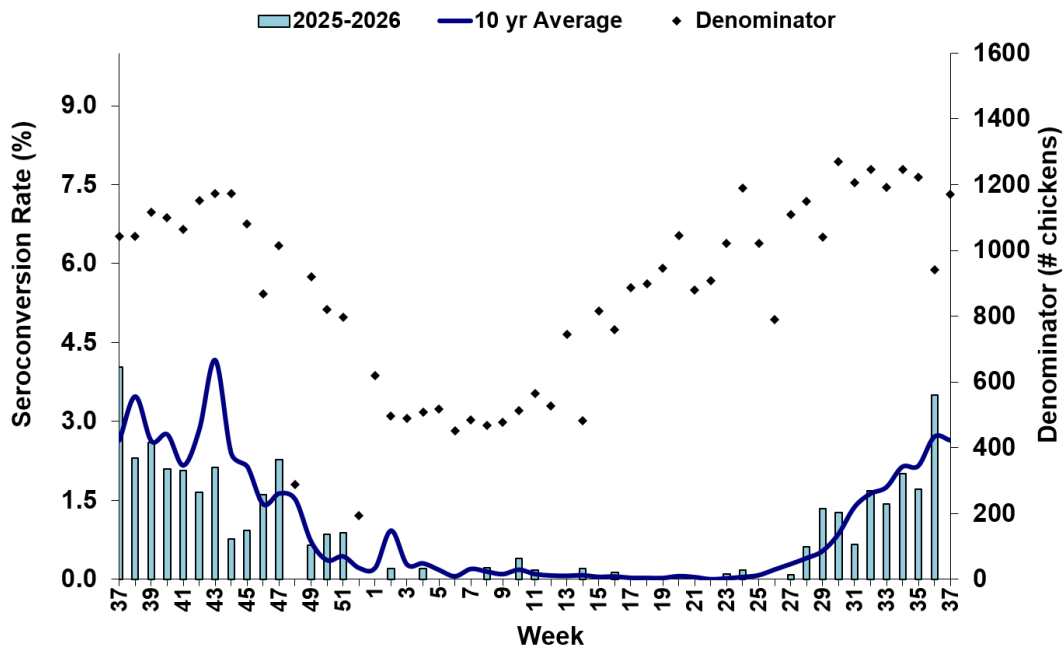
Sentinel Chickens

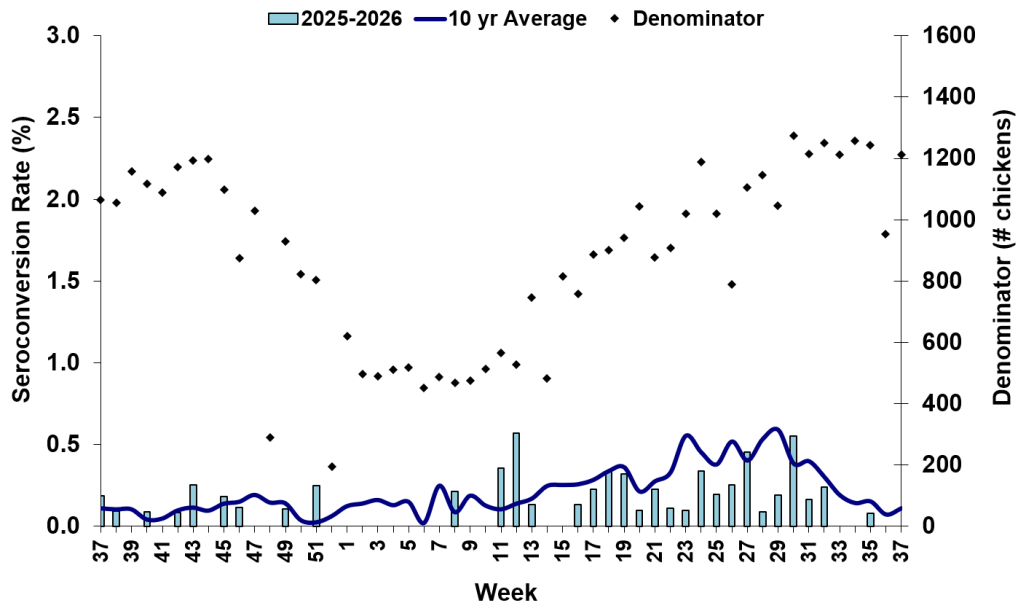

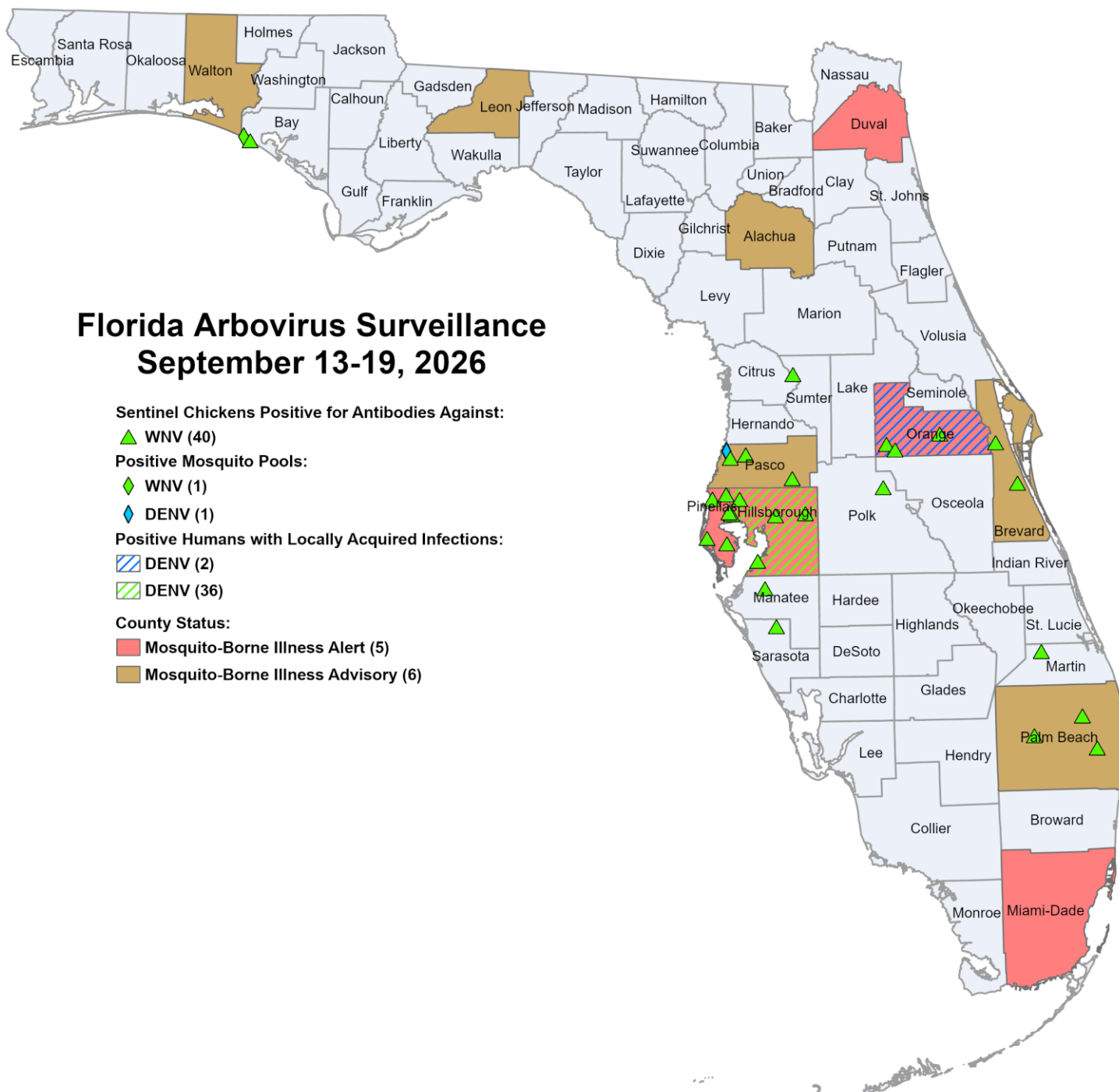
Dead Birds

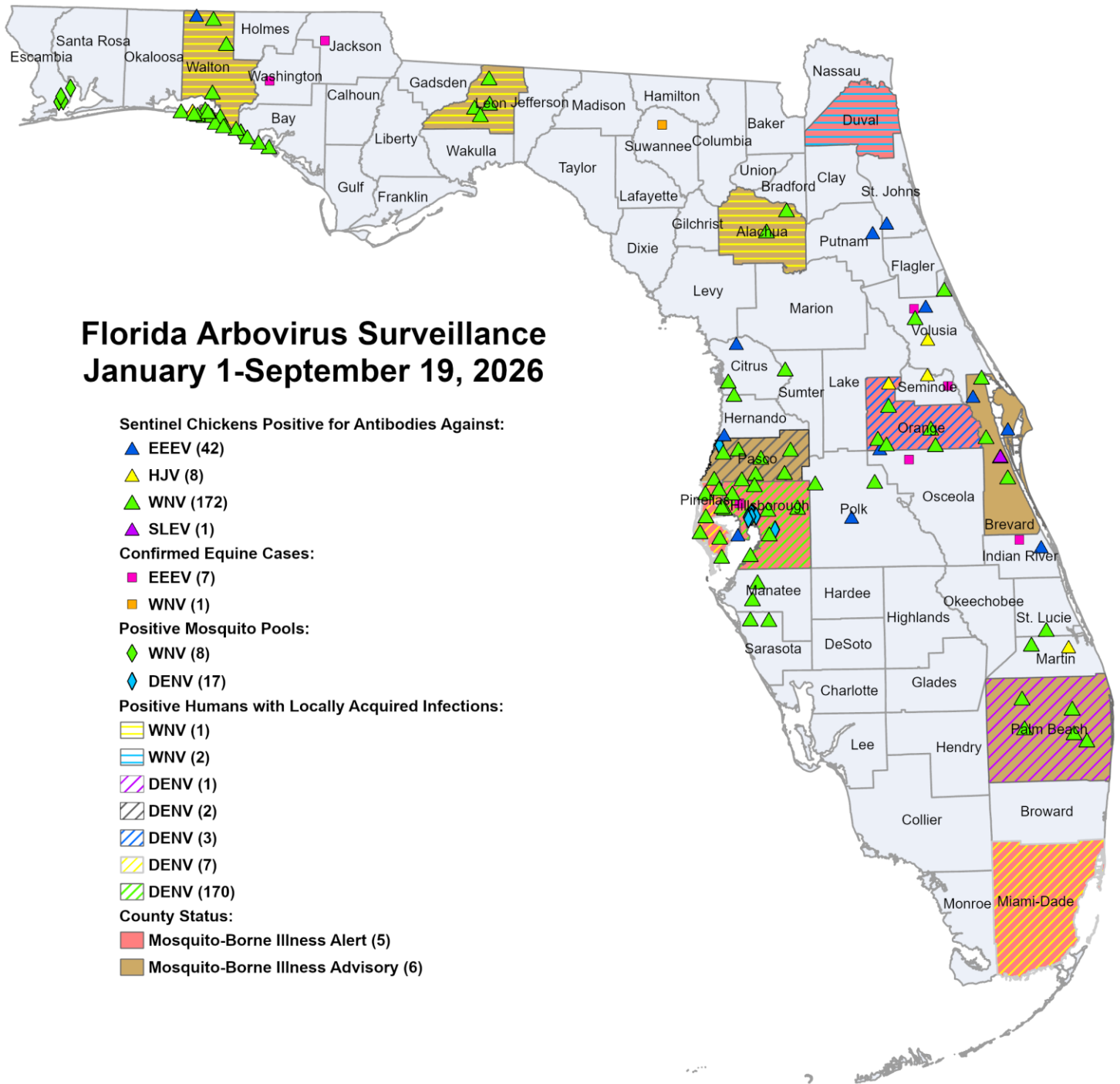
The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) collects reports of dead birds, which can be an indication of arbovirus circulation in an area. This week, 20 reports representing a total of 40 dead birds, including one crow, were received from 12 counties.

In 2026, 1404 reports representing a total of 3254 dead birds (73 crows, 29 jays, 402 raptors, 156 doves) were received from 52 of Florida's 67 counties.

Case tallies included in the weekly Florida arbovirus surveillance report include confirmed and probable cases for EEE, WNV infection, SLE, dengue, chikungunya, and malaria by date of onset. Suspect cases are not included. Activity is mapped by county of exposure rather than county of residence. Case definitions being used in Florida are consistent with national criteria provided by the Council of State and Territorial Epidemiologists (CSTE) and may be viewed at: www.floridahealth.gov/diseases-and-conditions/disease-reporting-and-management/disease-reporting-and-surveillance/index.html. Case tallies reported by CDC do not include suspect cases and cases are reported by patient state of residence rather than where the exposure occurred. Data is provided by county health departments, Department of Health Bureau of Public Health Laboratories, Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, mosquito control agencies, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, medical providers and veterinarians. Equine cases are provided by the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.
